Captains Report for November

It is pleasing to report no incidents in the Bungonia area during the last months, and only one incident in over 6 months. Many thanks to all of the residents who have done their burning off during the winter months.

Preparation for the Fire Season

Even though it is wet and green now, the situation can change dramatically in a short space of time and NOW is the time to prepare your place for fire if you have not done so already.

It was decided at the last meeting that the Captain draw up a maintenance roster for this fire season, so that regular maintenance can be done on the trucks. The maintenance team leader, John Edwards, will be in regular contact with rostered teams to let them know when their turn is due and to see that any faults are repaired.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy and fire free new Year.

We have enclosed in this issue of the Times, a Fire Check List, please keep it handy so you can "Check" it.

FIRE CHECKLIST

Is YOUR property prepared against bush fire and grass fires? The NSW Department of Bush Fire Services has produced this checklist for rural areas.

- * Ground fuels cleared around the house, including long, dry grass, dead leaves and branches, thick undergrowth.
- * Gutters cleared.
- * Roofing firmly fixed and cleaned of dry lead debris.
- * Firebreaks prepared - a well watered lawn can act as a firebreak.
- * Screens or shutters installed and under floor areas enclosed, if possible.
- * Vents into roof spaces screened with fine wire mesh.
- * Flammable items removed from around the house - woodpile and obvious flammable materials such as paper, boxes, crates, hanging baskets, and wooden garden furniture.
- * LPG gas tanks vented away from house.
- * Fire brigade telephone number placed near phone.

Do you have sufficient water supplies and fire fighting equipment?

- * Hoses long enough to reach all sides of the house, attached to taps.
- * Heavy duty hoses with wide-spray nozzles, if possible.
- * Reserve water supplies from tank, dam, or swimming pool, if possible, since mains water will be in high demand. Try to store water during winter months.
- * Gate valve fitted to water tank - a 38mm Storz coupling will help the bush fire brigade.
- * Gate valve to fit portable pump as well.
- * Regularly check petrol or diesel portable pump, if you have one, to ensure it starts easily.
- * Install a sprinkler system in your garden and on roofing, if affordable.
- * Gather buckets, preferably metal, mops, spray backpack units, ladders, rakes and shovels in one place for ready access during a fire.
- * Battery operated radio and torches in case of electricity failure.

What to do when fire approaches:

- * Listen to the radio for news of the fire's progress, rather than calling emergency services for information.
- * Dress in protective clothing, drink water frequently.
- * Wet-down the roof, house and garden, especially on the side of the approaching fire. Turn on sprinkler system if you have one.
- * Stop down pipes, fill gutters with water.
- * As the fire approaches, go inside and remain inside until the fire has passed.
- * Fill baths, sinks and buckets with water.
- * Place wet towels and blankets against gaps under doors and windows.
- * Close heavy curtains, close shutters, if you have them.
- * After the fire has passed and for several hours after, patrol your property and put out spot fires started by flying embers.
- * Check roof cavity frequently for spot fires.

The Purple Curse

Have you noticed how well Patersons Curse is growing this year? Huge expanses of purple flowers drifting across paddocks!

In addition to the ideal weather conditions, including good soaking rain, for weed growth, there is an interesting theory put forward by the experts: during the last drought, large quantities of feed needed to be brought in from other districts and, it seems, the dreaded weed seeds were brought in with it.

More Chooks

Another chicken broiler farm is being established on Marulan South Road, naturally subject to the standard strict conditions Council has developed from its Poultry Farming Guidelines.

The conditions are designed to safeguard the lifestyle of people living in surrounding areas while ensuring the workability of the farming enterprise.

Hangar Space

A subdivision has been approved to allow development of an additional 20 hangars at the existing Goulburn airport (for light planes only, contrary to Goulburn City Council's proposed airport in our Shire).

B-Pay

A question was asked of me about B-Pay (for payment of rates direct from a bank account).

This system is likely to be introduced as soon as the State Bank (where Council's account is held) in Goulburn can provide the facility.

Other options for payment, such as at local Post Offices, were investigated but have proved to be too costly to implement, or require very large amounts of transactions, way beyond the capacity of Mulwaree.

Official Opening

Marulan's new water supply facilities will be officially opened by the Minister for Land and Water Conservation, Richard Amery, at noon on Wednesday 9 December.

You are welcome to come along. The scheme is an award winning one and, if you are available, this is a good opportunity to see the setup.

More Official Openings

In late October I attended the official opening of the new Parkesbourne Fire Station by the Minister for Emergency Services, Bob Debus.

Late November there are official 'openings' (or

more correctly dedications) of the Fire Station at Marulan, the Remote Area Fire Team's and Support Brigade's headquarters located in Goulburn.

Together with several new tankers, the improvements to fire fighting facilities in the Shire have been noticeable. Bungonia Brigade will need to go on the order list for a new tanker soon as well.

Beautification of Bungonia

The Progress Association has called a meeting of all residents and local community organisations to discuss the possibility and options for beautification of the village.

My congratulations to Bungonia! I am thrilled that there are so many people around who are proud of their village and taking such a keen interest in making it an even better place to live.

The meeting is on Monday 7 December, 7.30pm at the Hall. If you care, come along!

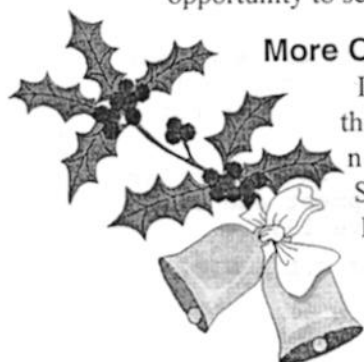
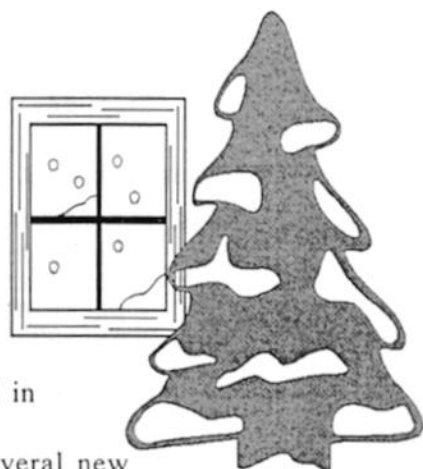

INVERARY CREEK LANDCARE DECEMBER REPORT.



ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING was held at "INVERARY" 9.11.98.

Election of Officers for 1999;-

In general business the main objectives were for the following year.

- # Continue with field day programme concentrating on an acid soils and farm forestry.
- # Emphasis on riparian zones with erosion works, stock exclusion and tree planting.
- # Further development of Inverary as a teaching resource, this could involve the construction of a shed for catering, field day and displays.
- # Promotion of farm forestry towards the 2020 Vision.

PRESIDENTS REPORT FOR 1998.

I can look over the Groups achievements over the past 12 months with some pride and feel we are well on the way to restoring a sustainable and viable catchment. Works completed in 1998, include extra reclamation on Inverary Creek, soil erosion control on Washedaway, completion of the Cowhole Creek Project, remnant vegetation and work on acid soils, more detailed report later.

The Landcare Group, I feel has reached a watershed in it's development. The majority of priorities on salinity, erosion and revegetation decline pin pointed in the original report in 1992 have been treated. We are probably one of the only Groups who can boast of such an achievement. There are still many smaller areas which can be treated by individual landowners. The main priorities on erosion work are on properties of owners not in the Group, so can't be included in any project work. I hope neighbours who have not been supportive will realise they are missing out on funding and the chance to improve their properties and will come back to the fold in 1999.

The main challenge in the future will be the sustainable land use of acid soils so prevalent in our areas. The acid soil problem is an integral part of erosion control and soil degradation, so needs much more emphasis in the future. Trials are underway or planned for farm forestry as an answer. (See individual project reports.)

Now the main problem of the catchment have been addressed we have an unequalled teaching resource to pass on our knowledge to others. This I feel should be the number one priority in the future. Already in 1999 several visits are planned by DLWC, Sydney Water, Healthy Rivers Commission Universities and more. We have the opportunity to pass on knowledge and so have an active voice in Catchment Management decisions. With these in mind I will attempt to have a resource centre funded -- a sheltered area for talks and displays, as well as catering for bus groups. This has been rejected by NHT, but am sure it can be funded elsewhere.

The active involvement of Sydney Water is very encouraging. With the recent problems I think they now realise more work must be funded at the catchment level. This leads to opportunities on serrated tussock control, commercial farm forestry and carbon credits. The carbon credit issue has thrown a completely new aspect on tree planting and one I will keep abreast with.

I feel this Group now has a lot to offer in the promotion of Catchment Management and Landcare and should work towards this. All the various trials since 1992 have shown very interesting results which must not be shelved, but passed on for everyones benefit.

My personal thanks go to the active members of Landcare, in particular Phil, Diane and Beryl how have helped in project development and on ground works. We look forward to a successful and active 1999.

Once again we are grateful for the support of C.M.C. and D.L.A.W.C.

Update for NAGA (No Airport for Goulburn Area)

Naga is continuing to organise strategies to combat the view that Gundry Plains would be a suitable place for Sydney's second airport, as we believe that disadvantages would far outweigh any benefits. The committee is currently drawing up a list of major points concerning the airport proposal and will also have available more detailed information for those wanting "heavy artillery".

There will be an information stand at the Windellama Small Farms Field Day on 5th December, and meetings are also being organised with politicians. In the new year, we plan to hold a further public meeting. Meanwhile, we urge you to support us in any way you can, and particularly by sending letters to politicians, both State and Federal, to let them know how you feel. Be sure to enclose a question that should be answered – we aim for people to think closely about the total implications of establishing Sydney's second airport in our region.

GARDENING IN DECEMBER

Time for planting beans, corn, beetroot, spinach, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, marrows, parsley, parsnips, pumpkins, late tomatoes, lettuce and radish.

Cauliflower seed can now be sown. Some of the varieties mature at different times and if you like large cauliflowers, this is the time to sow them for winter.

Broccoli can also be planted now and should be ready to cut during autumn.

It is also time to protect your fruit trees from fruit fly. Spray your apples, pears, peaches, nectarine and quinces with Rogor or Lebaycide. These two chemicals are absorbed by the skin of the fruit and is not washed off by rain. It is recommended to spray apples, pears, etc every three weeks and again two weeks before ripening.

If you have roses, and it is hot and humid, spray your roses with Benlate, if its dry, spray with Lebaycide. Fertilise with blood and bone or rose food.

GARDENING IN JANUARY

The late sowing of beans, corn, beetroot, spinach, broccoli, cabbage, lettuce and radish can still be done and there is still time to plant some zucchini seedlings for late summer/autumn.

Sprinkle Sulphate of Ammonia over your lawn and water well.

Keep the soil damp around the base of your roses and pruning out the centre can be done as well.

Mulch your garden beds to keep moisture in to help your plants get through the hot summer heat.

Sow pumpkins for winter harvesting. Traditionally pumpkins take up an enormous area of space but, for small areas, choose 'Butternut' which grows on a trellis. Bush type such as 'Golden Nugget' can even be grown in a large container. Pick fruit when the bush has died down completely.

Check tomatoes and capsicum for fruit fly. Boil infected fruit to kill larvae. Never, ever throw the rotten fruit into the compost or onto the ground.

Virus diseases, spread by insects, can attack tomatoes in hot weather. Wrap infected plants in a plastic bag and seal it, then spray plants with Malathion, using proper precautions.

Fertilise your specimen trees now and try not to touch the trunks when whippersniping as it will damage the trees.

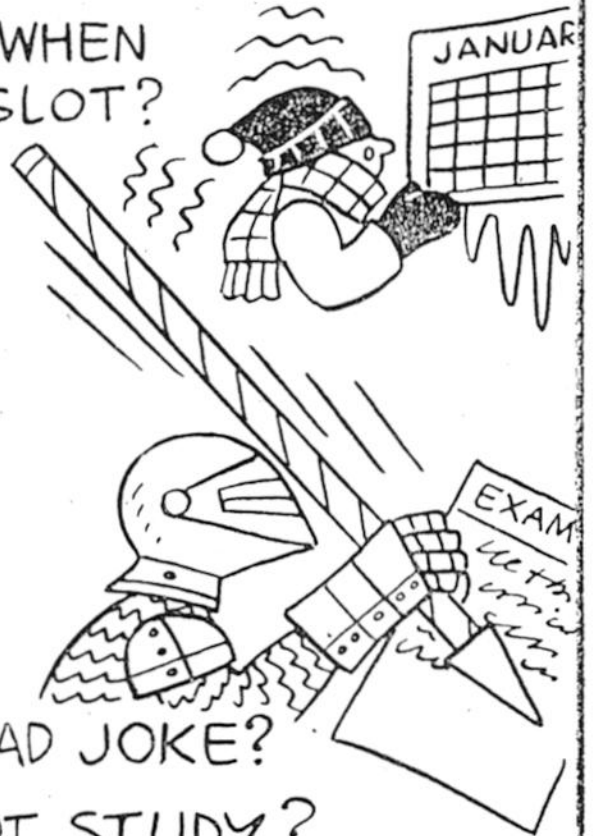

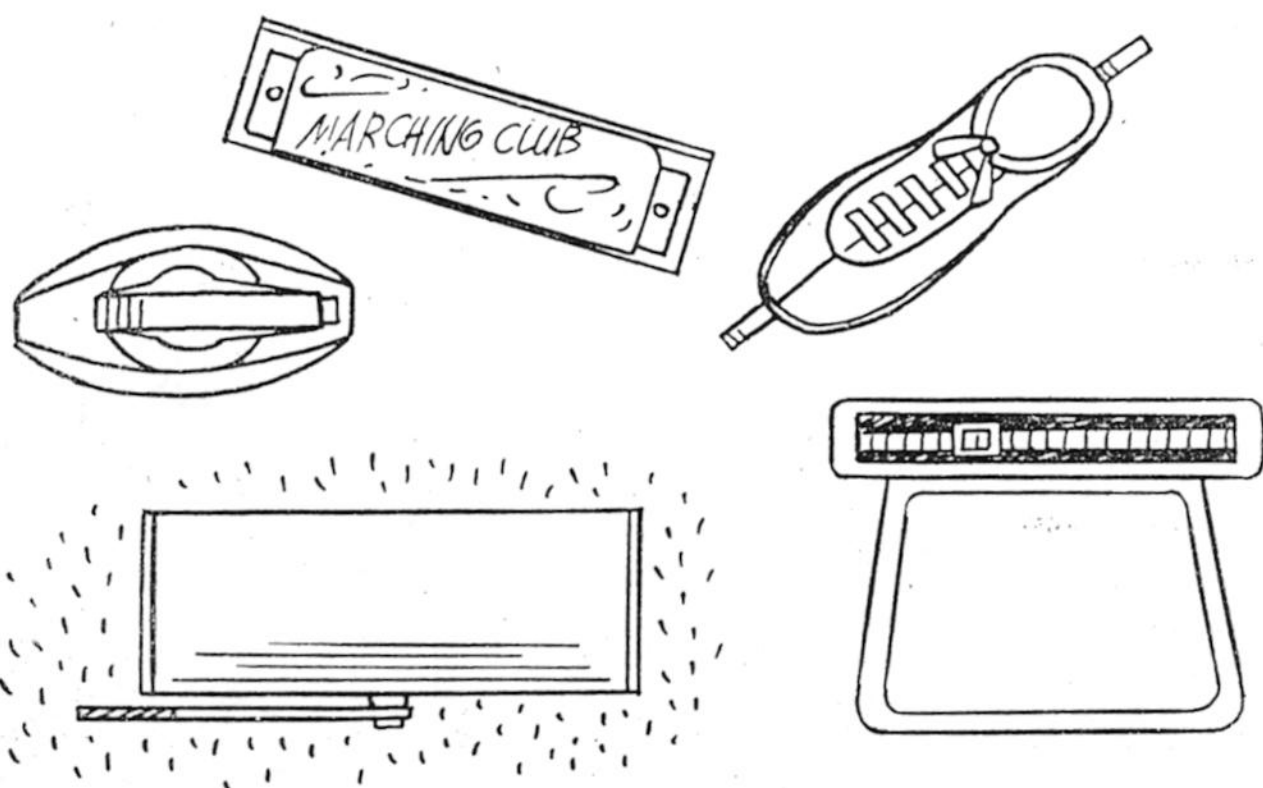

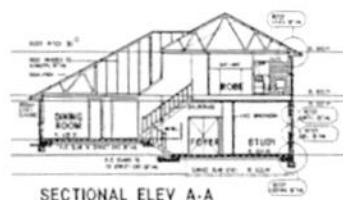
