## BUNGONIA RURAL FIRE SERVICE

### CAPTAINS REPORT FOR 1998/99.

A total of 4 incidents have been attended since my last report in December. Fire conditions are extremely dangerous at the moment, as the long dry grass is creating havoc with fire fighters having a lot of trouble putting the fires out.

On the 12th November 1998, 2 Bungonia tankers as well as 1 Parks and 2 Support tankers, attended a motor vehicle fire at "Glenlarry" where a set of jumper leads charging a battery shorted out when the bonnet was closed on them, the fire spread to the surrounding shed and contents and was contained by the Support Brigade by using foam.

The second fire involved approximately 10 hectare's of mainly grassland, 2 houses, 1 cottage and 1 shed were directly in the path of the fire. 2 Bungonia tankers and 14 crew members promptly attended, and with the assistance of 2 Support tankers and 2 Marulan tankers, contained the fire in approximately 1 hour. The fire was caused by a build up of dry grass around the exhaust on a motor mower.

On the 10th January 1999, 2 Bungonia tankers were called out to an illegal fire, with several heaps of timber alight. Residents are reminded that it is illegal to burn-off without a permit, and the burning of heaps should be carried out after the fire restrictions are lifted.

On the 15th January 1999, 1 Bungonia tanker, assisted Gundry tankers to control a grass fire on the Gundry Plains near "New Acres", this fire was very hard to control in the heavy fuel.

Bungonia Brigade has recently purchased a Toyota 4 x 4 table top, which has been fitted out with a 450 litre tank and pump. I would like to thank the members who have spent a lot of time making this unit ready for service. The call sign will be Bungonia 4/1.

Many thanks to the members who have assisted at these incidents.

## *Mulwaree Shire's move to new premises*

*From Monday the 18<sup>th</sup> of January, Mulwaree Shire Council will be operating from new premises in Clinton Street in Goulburn, having purchased the newer part of the Great Southern Energy building.*

*The long awaited move to the new premises reflects the growth of the Shire, and is a necessary step to cope with that growth and the subsequent increased demands on administration. The initial offer to buy the Great Southern building was made early in 1998.*

*The General Manager of Mulwaree Shire, Col Wotton, sees the move as representative of a significant change of direction and profile for the Shire, "Mulwaree Shire has experienced a period of consistent growth over recent years. A growing population, expanding commercial development and the subsequent increased demand for amenities and services have placed a strain on the old system and premises.*

*"Economic trends in rural areas have seen a change of focus for rural shires, with the task of stimulating economic growth now requiring a considerable concentration of effort.*

*"Alongside this, there is an ever expanding agenda of regulations and requirements demanded by State Government Departments that add to the administration workload. The new premises will enable us to exploit the Shire's future potential more effectively. It gives us room to move forward"*

*The traditional home of Mulwaree Shire since 1955 has been the Montague Street premises, and future plans for the building are currently being considered by Council.*

## BUNGONIA HISTORY

The following is a copy of a letter written by David Reid to the Colonial Secretary in 1832. The original is in the State Archives.

Inverary Park Argyle  
20<sup>th</sup> April 1832

Sir

In compliance with your letter of the 15<sup>th</sup> March, I have inspected the Road Gang No 38 the only one in the district.

The men have no complaints except that they say many of them consider themselves due for assignment. The provisions, both beef and flour are of the best quality, the blankets are very thin and not warm enough in the winter of this district, most of the men are without shoes. I inspected some new shoes at the huts and found them of a bad quality and too small for men and such as would not last one month. They were employed building bridges and were obliged to carry a distance of more than half a mile the slabs on their shoulders which galled them much for want of a strong dray to draw in the materials, the consequence of which is that the bridges are built of too slight materials for any time.

They had cart and two bullocks both worn out and they were away carrying lime to Bong Bong where the roads are making over stony ranges and men without shoes must have their feet cut to pieces carrying slabs.

As winter is now setting in I would recommend that they should have Parramatta cloth trousers and frocks as this district from its elevation is very cold and the winter severe, which will be a way of preserving their health. The overseer informed me that the gang consisted of 33 men but I don't think that there was above 15 men working so that unless the gangs are much increased there is no probability of the Road being opened for a long time as there are as many idlers in a small gang as there are in a large one.

## GARDENING IN FEBRUARY

Since this month can be one of the hottest in our district, a lot of watering and mulching can be carried out. With autumn approaching, now is the time to start planning your vegetable garden for a continuous supply of vegetables for winter.

Vegetables: it is very important now to start planting cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and brussel sprouts. This enables them to get established before the cold weather. They need a soil containing plenty of compost and well rotted animal manure, also a light dressing of lime before planting. When these plants start to grow give them a side dressing of nitrogen fertiliser and at regular intervals a liquid fertiliser applied in the cool of the day will assist the plants in growing, as they all do better if grown quickly.

Other vegetables that can be planted are carrots, parsnips, celery, kohlrabi, lettuce, parsley, radish and turnips.

Flowers: if you have a sunny garden facing the north, now is the time to start planting for winter flowers, which is possible in our climate. Plant seedlings of pansies, viola, stocks, poppies and alyssums. Other flowers to plant are calendula, carnations, polyanthus, larkspur, linaria, snapdragons, statice and verbenas.

Fruit Trees: with warm weather still with us, fruit fly starts to appear, so continue spraying apple, pear and quince trees to control these little pests using Rogor or Lebaycide.

Odd Jobs: this month mildew on cucumbers, marrow, squash and zucchini leaves can be controlled by spraying with Zineb or Benlate. It is not a serious problem as the peak of the harvest is nearly over.

Another job is rose pruning. One can reduce the height of the new wood and this will ensure a crop of new well developed roses in autumn. They will benefit also from a light dressing of complete rose fertiliser.

JANUARY 1999.



Now is the time, early in Summer to plan your tree planting for this year. The ripper moulder from D.L.W.C. has already been organised for January to prepare sites on five properties of Landcare members. This machine is available to any other landholder by contacting D.L.W.C. in Goulburn.

Once again we must highlight the need for correct preparation and care of tree lots to ensure success. It is disappointing to see attempts of landholders in this regard. There are no short cuts if you want good results. One local area has been planted twice in 2 years with almost 100% failure because of lack of preparation and maintenance. Field days are organised at Inverary to demonstrate correct techniques, so make use of them. Once again we emphasise the necessary steps for success.

RIP AND MOUND. This can be done with conventional farm machinery, but not really successfully. Ripping with a special winged tyne as used by D.L.W.C. ensures good soil shatter and depth. Rip if possible to a minimum of 60-70cms to allow soil shatter and sufficient moisture build up. Mounding is not essential, but certainly is desirable, particularly in moist areas and heavy soils. Where possible rip and mound tree lines on a key line pattern to ensure full use of all rain that falls. The spacing depends on what you want to plant, but we suggest as a guide a 4x2.5 grid (1000 trees per hectare).

ORDER tree in advance to avoid disappointment (Sophie Clayton 0262072492 or Tumut Forestry Nursery 0269476210) Eucalypts and Natives we suggest Jayfield Nursery Holbrook 0260367235)

PLANTING. Radiata can be planted when available from May to September while natives are best planted in Spring. Landcare members have full use of our own moulder planter which are not available for hire.

WEED CONTROL. There is no point in correct preparation and planting unless you have adequate weed control. Weeds don't wait until you are ready to spray. Organise weed control before or soon after planting, at least by early Spring. Adequate control is even more essential in good farming land with phalaris based pasture. Poor weed control will result in very poor survival and growth rates.

FUTURE OF FARM FORESTRY. As we have said before there is a huge potential for farm forestry in this area and no doubt you will hear of large plantings around here and the A.C.T. in the near future. Maybe more landholders will follow the example of Inverary growers in 1999 and get into the action. If anyone wants up to date information on N.S.W. farm forestry incentives (TV add), carbon credit trading or anything to do with farm forestry then contact K.M. Cooper on 0248444214.

CARBON TRADING. There will be a half day seminar in Canberra next month to explain all the implications of carbon trading. This certainly is a very exciting concept, but will take some time to put into place. Inverary Landcare will be represented at the seminar and will keep members up to date with developments. The only advice we can give now is to keep an accurate record of all plantings so you may be able to benefit in a few years time. Even though carbon credit trading may not be put into practice before 2005 it will be back dated to 1990, so it will be essential you keep accurate records of all plantings, including direct seeding and management of native remnants.

## Council Meetings

If any confidential issues arise, such as legal, commercial or staffing matters, these will be dealt with first and the opening of the meeting to the public may be delayed a few minutes.

You are welcome to come along and see how your Council does business on your behalf.

## New Address

Council has now moved to its new premises in Clinton Street, Goulburn - the newer part of the Great Southern Energy buildings.

The phone and fax numbers remain unchanged.

Now that the cramped working conditions of the old Montague building are gone, you should experience improved service.

With both population and

business opportunity growth in Mulwaree continuing, the new facilities were much needed and will be a good investment for ratepayers.

## Four Wheel Driving

The Toyota Landcruiser Club of Australia has received approval to operate club facilities at a Willow Glen Road, Boro, property. Activities will include driver training, self drive tracks, organised club activities and bush camping. A shelter shed, toilet block and storage containers will be built.

## Rural Addressing

Numbers are now being placed on all properties throughout the Shire as the final stage of the rural addressing program.

Use of the number for your postal address will become operative from 1 July.

Council decided it would provide a uniform numbering system for all properties so that emergency and delivery vehicles and visitors could locate properties easily.

It was also decided that the cost of \$10 per property to buy and install the number would be borne by Council.

Letters will be going out to everyone as the numbers go up to explain the numbering system.

## Heavy Metal

Some years ago biosolids from Sydney Water's sewerage treatment operations began arriving in the region as farm fertiliser with

appropriate assurances as to its safety for this use.

Testing carried out last year on the Goulburn Biosolids Trial site at Murrays Flat revealed excessive levels of copper, zinc and cadmium in some dust trap samples. Zinc levels in some of the traps have skyrocketed.

Council has written to NSW Agriculture and the Minister voicing its concerns and asking for biosolid applications in the Shire to cease immediately.

## Companion Animals

The Companion Animal Act which came into force last year requires at least one public place in the Shire to be declared as an "off leash" area.

Given the predominantly rural nature of Mulwaree, it is impracticable to provide an area to meet this requirement and Council has requested that the Minister waive this clause for the Shire.

The Act also requires that dogs and cats be implanted with a microchip for identification, at the owner's cost. Mulwaree is joining other Councils in objecting to this requirement.

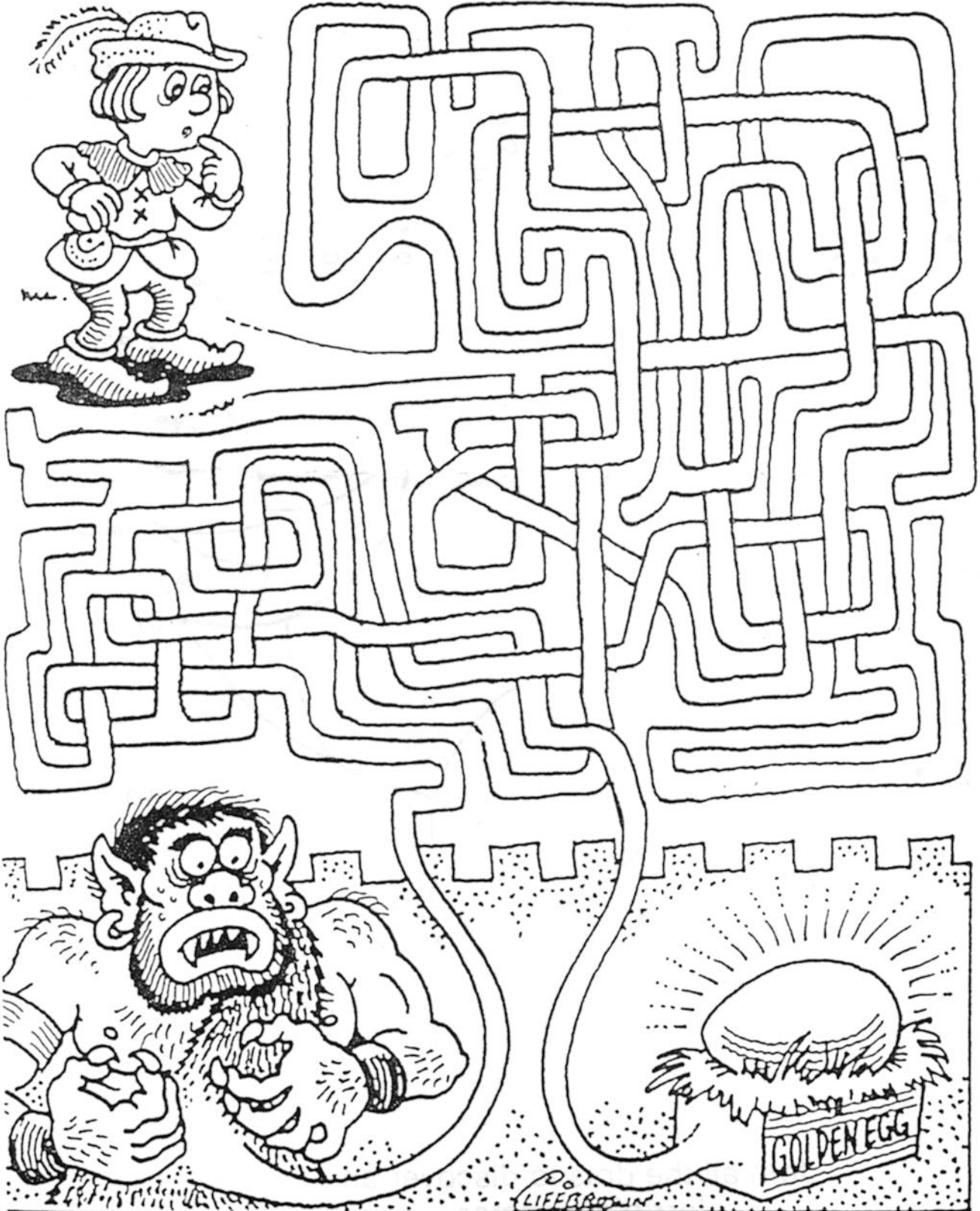

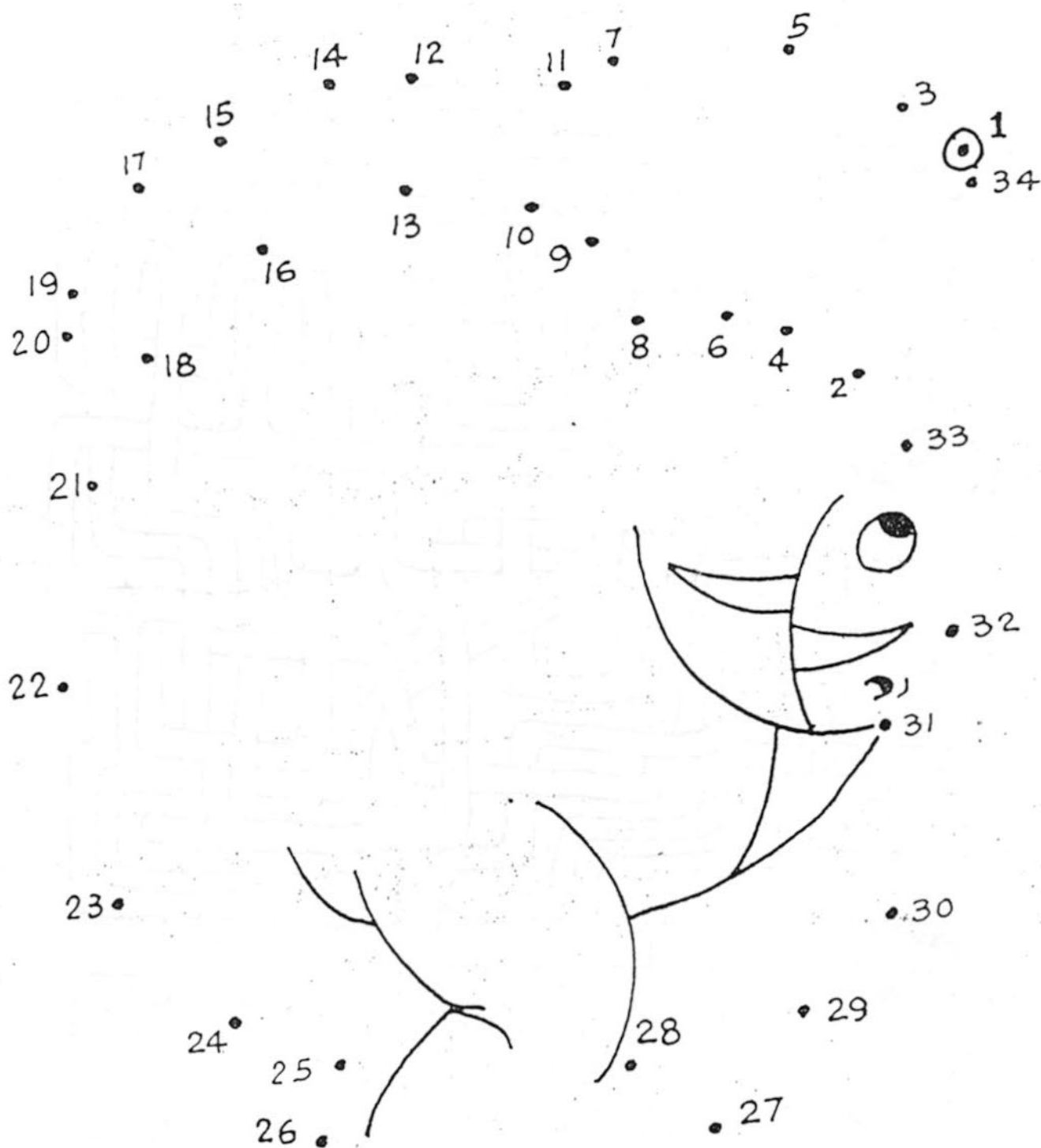
