## GARDENING IN FEBRUARY

February can be one of the hottest months in our district, a lot of watering and mulching can be done much the same as January.

With autumn approaching now is the time to start planning your vegetable garden for a continuous supply of vegetable during winter.

Vegetables: It is important to start planting cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and brussel sprouts. This will enable them to get established before the cold weather. They like to grow in well composted and well rotted animal manure, also a light dressing of lime before planting. A side dressing nitrogen fertiliser and liquid fertiliser applied in the cool of the day will assist them to grow quickly.

Other vegetables that can be planted are carrots, parsnips, celery, kohlrabi, lettuce, parsley, radish and turnips.

Flowers: If you have a sunny garden facing the north, now is the time to start planting for winter flowers, which is possible in our climate. Plant seedlings of pansies, viola, stocks, poppies and alyssums. Other flowers to plant are calendula, carnations, polyanthus, larkspur, linaria, snapdragons, statice and verbenas.

Also this month spring flowering bulbs start to appear in nurseries and lots of colours are available so your garden can be matched colour wise easily.

Fruit Trees: With warm weather still with us, fruit fly starts to appear, so continue spraying apple, pear and quince trees to control these little pests, using Rogor or Lebaycide.

General: This month mildew can be a problem as well on some vegetable leaves, this can be controlled by spraying with Zineb or Benlate. It is not a serious problem as the peak of the harvest is nearly over.

Another job is rose pruning. One can reduce the height of the new wood and this will ensure a crop of new well developed roses in the autumn. They will benefit also from a light dressing of complete rose fertiliser.

## **LIBRARY NEWS**

### **Legal Information Access centre at the Library**

The Goulburn Branch Library is now housing a new legal information service, recently commenced by the Southern Tablelands Regional Library (STRL). The service, named Legal Information Access Centre (LIAC), is a joint initiative of the State Library of NDE, the Law Foundation of NSW and STRL. The aim of LIAC is to provide members of the public with free access to plain language legal information. The service provides legal information, not legal advice, and is complimentary to other legal services offered in the area. Library staff have been thoroughly trained in using a range of up to date legal books, pamphlets, and internet resources covering a wide scope of legal issues.

Southern Tablelands LIAC can be of assistance to anyone who wishes to know more about a legal problem, be it how to find a lawyer, what to do about a neighbours barking dog, how to get a divorce, or how to put a will together. Library staff will help you locate up to date information that will allow you to make an informed decision about how to deal with your particular situation. All residents in the area serviced by STRL (Crookwell, Goulburn, Gunning, Mulwaree, Tallaganda and Yass) will benefit from this new service, either directly through resources located at their local branch library, or by referral to the Southern Tablelands LIAC, located at Goulburn Branch Library.

## FEBRUARY REPORT.

The new millennium will see changes and challenges for Landcare in our area. Being part of the Sydney Water Catchment will ensure many farming activities will come under closer scrutiny and tighter Government controls, following a recently completed audit into Sydney's water supply catchment.

Previously the emphasis has been on tight control on small areas of the inner catchment, but now the Sydney Catchment Authority (SCA) realises it must control water quality from the whole catchment, an area of 10,000 sq. kms from Lithgow to the source of the Shoalhaven River near Cooma and the Wollomdilly near Crookwell.

The Shoalhaven C.M.C. and previously the Upper Shoalhaven C.M.C. have been replaced by a much larger body, the Southern Management Board which encompasses Illawarra and Port Hacking, as well as the Shoalhaven and several coastal estuaries. Under the original C.M.C. which controlled only our own catchment, the local community via it's representatives had some say in policy development. With the establishment of 18 Catchment management Boards to cover the whole State, this may not be so easy.

The preparation of a new Regional Environmental Plan to cover the catchment will certainly have many implications for Shires and landholders. With much of our area now being subdivided into smaller allotments, land use practices will be under tighter control. The report by the S.C.A. identifies a range of factors in the catchment which may pose potential hazards on water quality, including sewage management, farm practices, erosion control, mining and industrial development.

In the case of agriculture, the report highlights effluent run off from intensive farm lots, riparian zones damage, over clearing, grazing management, fertilizer application and pesticides as factors potentially affecting water quality running off the farm.

Just what statutory powers the S.C.A. will have has not been finalised, but you can be certain they will be far reaching. It is to be hoped that the new Catchment managing Boards with local representatives will concentrate more on working with local communities to understand the problems, rather than have a heavy handed regulatory approach.

With all this in mind the role of Landcare is even more significant. The Inverary Group have already encompassed many of the proposed changes in their policy of restoration of the catchment by desirable land use practices. These include extensive earthworks to reduce erosion and control run off, salinity projects, work on acid soils, fencing off riparian areas, managing remnant vegetation and extensive revegetation and most importantly trying to educate others into adopting these practices.

All the above Landcare projects have been made possible by a series of Government grants and incentives. It is quite unrealistic to expect individual landholders to launch out on a series of restoration projects without funding. If the Government and S.C.A. want genuine changes then someone has to come up with funding support, which at present is very minimal.

I still believe Farm Forestry has a huge potential on the poorer soil sites as a landcare management tool. Unfortunately the whole emphasis of N.H.T. funding and State Government still favours native vegetation and frowns on exotics such as *p.radiata*. Despite all the Government television advertising on N.H.T. and forestry development the level of funding is pitiful. It is high time in the new millennium to go back to basics and realise exotics are now part of our environment. This can not be reversed, so why not fully utilise their potential and forget the "native" bandwagon.

# In Council with Inda Evans

Welcome to the New Year, the new decade, the new century and the new millennium! (For the purists - celebrating the new millennium at the end of 2000 will give us a second opportunity to have a big party!) I wish you every success in all your endeavours this year.

Councillors debate the issues listed in the business paper each month. Although members of the public are not permitted to participate in the debate, you can raise any issues of concern to you with your councillors before the meeting date.

## Septic Systems

There was an excellent response to Council's request for expressions of interest in a seminar about becoming a "self certifier" of septic systems on rural properties.

Everyone who responded should have received a reply from Council by now.

Because this is a State Government imposed requirement, and will affect all rural Councils in NSW, Mulwaree Council is seeking funding from the State for preparing the seminar content.

## Weeds

A new weed called Chilean Needle Grass has been discovered in some parts of the Shire. It looks so much like spear grass, it is impossible to identify unless you are a specialist.

The good news is that it does contain some nutrition so it will not reduce paddocks to useless wastelands.

If you haven't sprayed Serrated Tussock this season, it's probably too late because it's gone to seed. But it's not too late for woody weeds like blackberry and briars.

The season has been good for the spread and growth of all these pests. I discovered new infestations of

tussock in our paddocks which had been free of this disaster in previous years. I guess all I can do is get out there with a mattock and keep digging the blighters out before they take over completely.

## Historic Event

Christ Church in Bungonia is now officially listed on the State Heritage Register and Council has amended its Local Environmental Plan to include the church.

Congratulations to all who had a part in preparing the history and conservation plan for this wonderful building. It well deserves to be on the register and Bungonia can be proud to include it in its own heritage.

## Developments Approved

An olive grove on Inverary Road and a pet cemetery and crematorium on Nerrimunga Creek Road

Building and development applications have skyrocketed this financial year - more than double the number received at the same time last year.

In the six months to 31 December, 68 applications for new dwellings were received compared with 33 in 1998/99.

Almost 12 new homes a month in the Shire is a certain sign of positive growth.

The total of all development applications in the period was 216 with a combined value of \$11.7 million. And that must bring work to many local enterprises.

## Commitments

In addition to direct Council work, my commitments this year include chairing the Southern Tablelands Regional Library Committee and the Southern Tablelands Health Council as well as board membership of Southcare (aero-medical helicopter service based in Canberra) and Southern Tablelands Regional Arts - a busy schedule which may mean I miss some of our local community meetings.

I am no less committed, however, to local issues and will always be available to discuss any of your concerns.

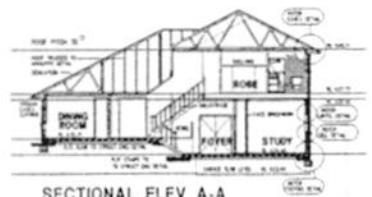

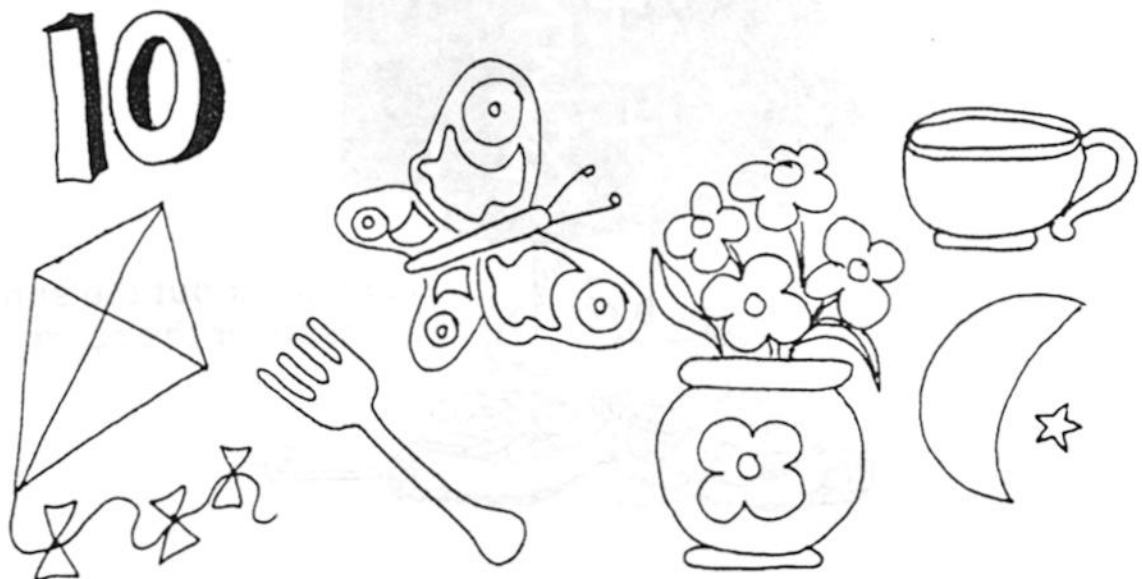
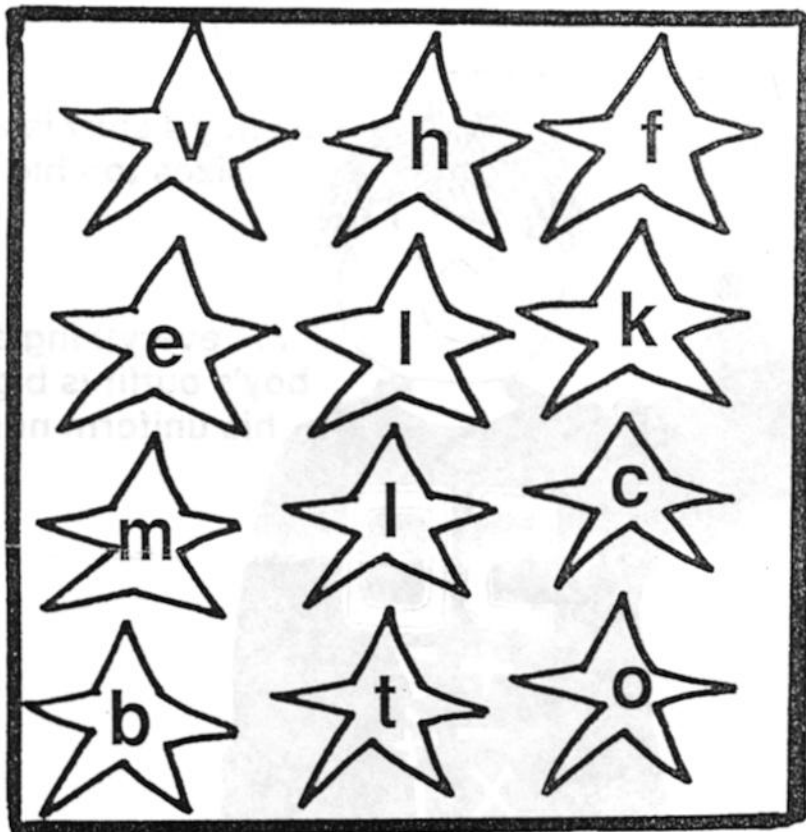
