Health Improvements

I am thrilled to announce some new developments in the health field for the Shire, particularly our part of it.

Council has donated a block of land in Marulan for building the "headquarters" for Community Health services provided as an outreach service by the Community Health Centre in Goulburn.

A State Government funding grant will enable a small building to be erected on the site as the first stage of what I hope will become quite an extensive little health service.

Community nurse, Frank Brady, will work out of the centre and we hope to add further services such as visiting physiotherapist, women's nurse, etc as soon as possible.

Frank Brady already travels around the Shire to make home visits to those in need and can be contacted on 4828 during office hours if you would like to talk to him.

The centre could also soon house the doctor's surgery and pharmaceutical services as well.

I have been lobbying, pushing, prodding and begging for this type of facility in our rapidly growing region for a number of years and now it looks like coming to fruition at last. I'm very happy and relieved, to say the least.

Library News

Your Passport to the World

Start off the 2003 school year with a library card from the Goulburn Library. A library card is your key to the multitude of resources available for recreation and school purposes.

To become a library member is easy. Membership is free to all residents of Mulwaree Shire. To join, bring with you a piece of identification such as a drivers licence with your current residential address or rates notice. All you need to do is fill in a membership form, sign your library card and you can borrow that day. If a child or young adult wishes to become a library member, a parent needs to come to the library with them with a piece of identification, as the parent needs to sign the library membership form.

For students once you are a library member you will have access to:

Junior Subject – Books in this collection cover a variety of subjects from bushrangers, gold to countries of the world and are written specifically for primary and lower secondary school students. This is the area that will help students with their school projects. Two books on any one subject can be borrowed at one time.

Junior Fiction – Animal, fantasy, Australian stories are just some of the themes covered in the Junior Fiction collection. The novels of well known and up and coming authors are added to Junior Fiction regularly including Paul Jennings, Moya Simons, Brian Jacques and Emily Rodda.

Information CD's – Recreational and educational CD's are available for children and young adults. Junior CD's include Sesame Street : Letters, Bob the Builder : Can We Fix It? and Wild Animals. CD's for young adults include J.F.K. Assassination : A Visual Investigation, War in the Pacific, Prime Ministers Australia and Eyewitness History of the World.

Young Adult Subject – These books are written for students in middle and upper secondary school and cater for school and recreational needs. Subjects covered include textiles, writing resumes and essay writing.

Young Adult Fiction – Books by great Australian authors including John Marsden, Margaret Clark and Libby Hathorn as well as international authors are located in the Young Adult Fiction collection housed in the Y.A.R.D (Young Adult Reading Den).

Young Adult Magazines – Magazines in the collection include Dolly, Smash Hits and Hyper and are also found in the Y.A.R.D (Young Adult Reading Den).

Gardening in February

February can be one of the hottest months in our district, a lot of watering and mulching can be done much the same as January.

With autumn approaching now is the time to start planning your vegetable garden for a continuous supply of vegetable during winter.

Vegetables: It is important to start planting cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli and brussel sprouts. This will enable them to get established before the cold weather. They like to grow in well composted and well rotted animal manure, also a light dressing of lime before planting. A side dressing nitrogen fertiliser and liquid fertiliser applied in the cool of the day will assist them to grow quickly.

Other vegetables that can be planted are carrots, parsnips, celery, kohlrabi, lettuce, parsley, radish and turnips.

Flowers: If you have a sunny garden facing the north, now is the time to start planting for winter flowers, which is possible in our climate. Plant seedlings of pansies, viola, stocks, poppies and alyssums. Other flowers to plant are calendula, carnations, polyanthus, larkspur, linaria, snapdragons, statice and verbena.

Also this month spring flowering bulbs start to appear in nurseries and lots of colours are available so your garden can be matched colour wise easily.

Fruit Trees: With warm weather still with us, fruit fly starts to appear, so continue spraying apple, pear and quince trees to control these little pests, using Rogog or Lebaycide.

General: This month mildew can be a problem as well on some vegetable leaves, this can be controlled by spraying with Zineb or Benlate. It is not a serious problem as the peak of the harvest is nearly over.

Another job is rose pruning. One can reduce the height of the new wood and this will ensure a crop of new well developed roses in the autumn. They will benefit also from a light dressing of complete rose fertiliser.

LANDCARE UP DATE

Inverary Creek Landcare Group applied through NHT and SCA for extra funding for projects on revegetation of Spring Creek, but both projects have been rejected -- Not a good start to 2003

Landcare in NSW has become strangled by the green agenda of the Carr Government and will no doubt lose any impact it should have had on the environment. The fiasco with NPWS on the recent fires in Morton National Park and the Snowy and Brindabellas shows just how little they understand the Australian environment and ecosystem

Back to the unfunded project "Biodiversity Management in Spring Creek" the application was for a further 10 hectares of radiata pine to revegetate a very degraded site. Radiata pine would have successfully reclaimed the highly eroded and acid soils, improved water quality, controlled serrated tussock, increased biodiversity and given the landholder an economic return. In other words satisfied all the nice environmental outcomes, but was rejected because of p radiata {a horrible exotic}.

Extensive trials by our Landcare Group ANU and CSIRO show natives cannot be successfully revegetated on the highly acid conditions, but radiata thrive as a stabilising crop. After a 30 year rotation then the soils have been changed enough to replant with pasture or natives. The project was rejected by the NSW panel not the CMB or NHT showing again environmental thinking in NSW is still in the dark ages.

At this stage I feel it is far too early to be passing blame on the recent fires. After all as I write this hundreds of fire fighters are still battling the heat and fires and doing a magnificent job. When heads start to roll over fire management NPWS must accept full responsibility. In 1950/60 I completed a Litt B degree in Forestry Ecology and remember then some detail of fire suppression trials in the Brindabellas by CSIRO. All their recommendations on regular control burning were soon forgotten by NPWS who now must cop the flack you would have seen on TV the pathetic mummings of our Minister and NPWS manager answering the criticisms of Wilson Tuckey. For far too long the Landcare movement and environment problems have been a political football. How easy it is to get the preference of some way out group by establishing another National Park

Until Landcare in NSW looks at National resource management in an integrated and much wider focus it will fail. I feel I have a much better knowledge of environmental problems in our area than a faceless (probably very green) NSW panel. As a Group we have decided what we want and will continue in that direction despite the ridiculous guidelines of NHT--- this probably will not gain us many friends.

The SCA refusal again is interesting. Paul Shanahan of SCA has visited the plantings of 2 former projects involving in of p. radiata -- the SCA is happy with them and the results.

A meeting in Braidwood last year on the future of Welcome Reef Dam recommended pine, but now they will und natives only -- no doubt more green pressure.

On a brighter note in a serious drought year a recent sample count on 2002 plantings show 92-95 % survival which is remarkable. I can't emphasise the importance of early and thorough ground preparation.

The DLWC ripper sand moulder will soon be in this area for preparation for 2003.

I have by the way invited political parties to Inverary before the next election.

PROTECTING YOUR HOME DURING A BUSH FIRE

With your fire prevention work properly completed, you will need to decide whether to stay with your home or evacuate in the event of bush fire. Whatever you decide, plan for it before the bush fire danger period begins. When action is required, follow your plan - lives are most often lost during unplanned, last minute evacuations. Generally there is no need to evacuate provided the proper precautions have been taken. Being there can often make all the difference because spot fires can be extinguished before they take hold and cause serious property damage.

If instructed to evacuate by the police, go as directed.

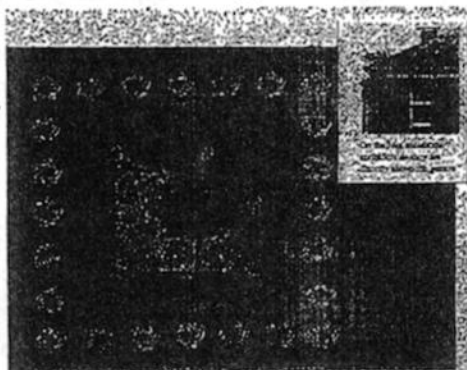
Water supply

An adequate, reliable water supply is critical. An independent reserve of at least 22,000 litres must be held in storage, whether it comes from a bore, dam or swimming pool. You will also need a reliable means of supplying water to outlets and hoses under pressure. The electricity supply cannot be relied upon during a bush fire emergency so it is essential to have a portable pump coupled to a diesel or petrol motor. You should also make provisions for the rapid filling of fire fighting tanks - an overhead tank is ideal for this purpose.

If your farm is large you should have your own fire fighting unit, with its own pump and motor, hoses and water tank. Keep this unit regularly maintained, with a careful check before the bush fire danger period begins, so that it is ready to use and easy to start during a bush fire emergency.

Personal Protection Sprinkler Systems

An extension to the garden watering system can be extremely valuable in defending the house. For example, large ground sprinklers placed on the windward side so that the roof eaves and verandahs can be kept wet will provide excellent protection in addition to other measures. Sprinkler systems may need additional water supplies.



Communications

The greatest cause of confusion during a bush fire emergency is lack of communication, when people likely to be affected by fire do not know what is happening. To keep you up to date so you can make well-informed decisions, use the local radio network - CB listening sets or public radio station. Because electricity may be cut during a bush fire, your radios will need to be battery powered. Keep them ready for use throughout the bush fire danger period.

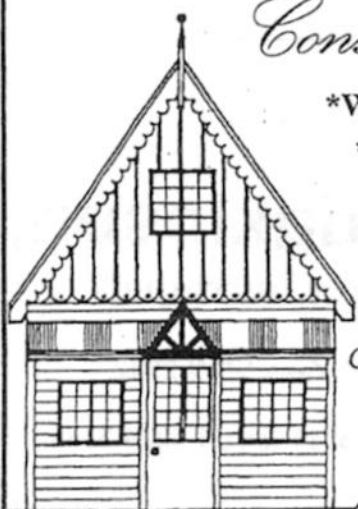

During a Total Fire Ban no fire may be lit in the open. A Total Fire Ban happens when there is a strong possibility of serious bush fires. This will happen on days that are very hot and dry, normally with a strong wind. This will normally follow a period without rain when the bush and grass land is very dry. On days like this the fire danger is extreme.

New South Wales is divided into 17 areas for weather forecasts. There may only be a Total Fire Ban in one or two areas. The newspapers, radio and television will tell you if there is a Total Fire Ban in your area. If you are not sure call the fire brigade, the police or your local council. Total Fire Bans normally last for 24 hours (a day) and start and finish at midnight.

During a Total Fire Ban you can not use a wood or charcoal barbecue but you can use a gas or electric one if you follow these rules. The barbecue must be at someone's house and under the direct control of an adult. The ground around the barbecue must be cleared for at least 3 metres of all material that could burn and you need a continuous supply of water available like a garden tap.

PREPARE YOUR HOME FOR BUSH FIRES

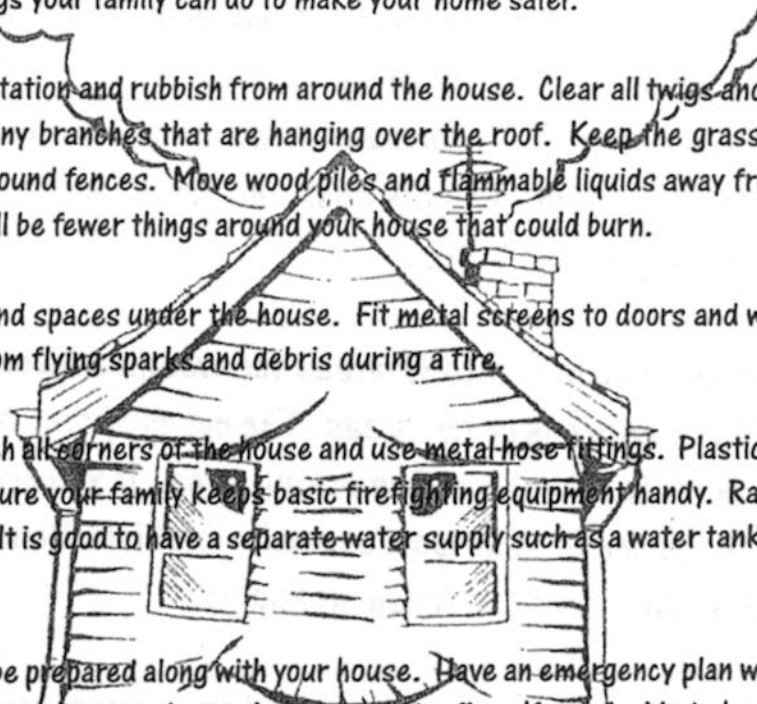
If you live in an area where there may be bush fires you must get your home ready for the threat of fire. There are lots of things your family can do to make your home safer.

Clear dry wood, vegetation and rubbish from around the house. Clear all twigs and leaves out of the gutters and remove any branches that are hanging over the roof. Keep the grass short and green. Clear undergrowth around fences. Move wood piles and flammable liquids away from the house. By doing all this there will be fewer things around your house that could burn.

Close in open eaves and spaces under the house. Fit metal screens to doors and windows. This will protect your home from flying sparks and debris during a fire.

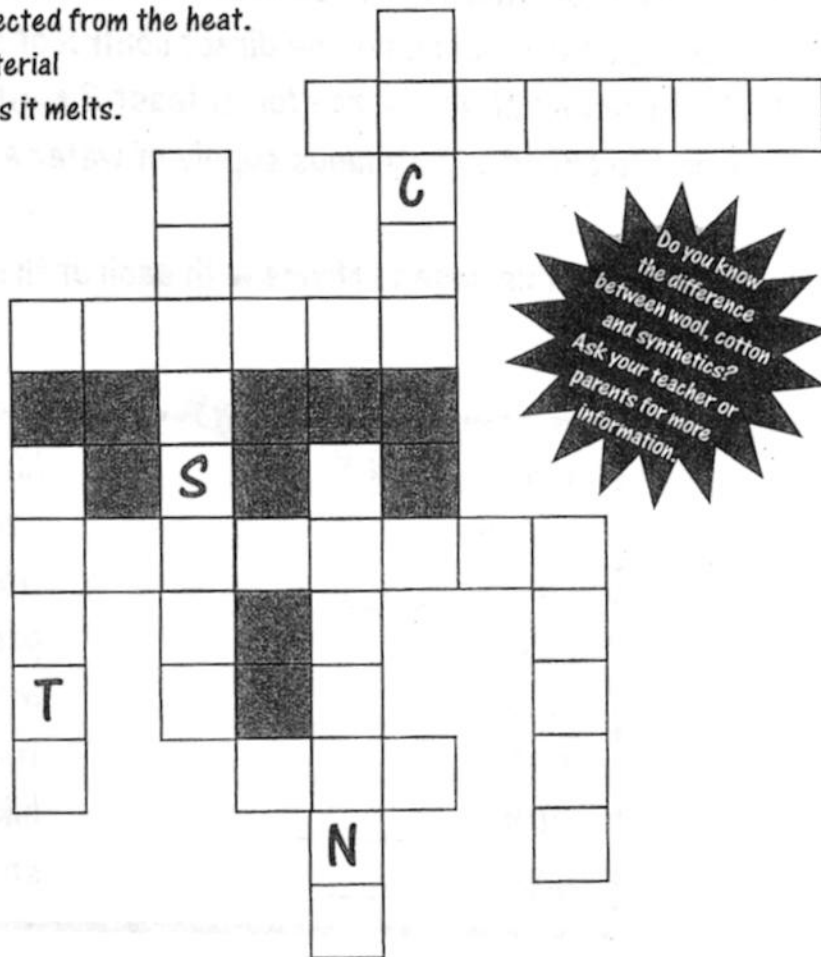
Make sure hoses reach all corners of the house and use metal hose fittings. Plastic fittings may melt during a fire. Make sure your family keeps basic firefighting equipment handy. Rakes, buckets and mops will be needed. It is good to have a separate water supply such as a water tank or swimming pool as well.

Your family needs to be prepared along with your house. Have an emergency plan which everyone has practised and make sure everyone knows how to report a fire. If you decide to leave your house you must go long before the fire approaches. Have the right clothes ready. You need to be protected from the heat. They should be made of natural material like cotton or wool - not synthetic as it melts.
