Report from the Rural Lifestyle Residents Action Group, sub committee of the Bungonia Progress Association.

The Committee is pleased to report that the Public Meeting, held on the 10th May to discuss aspects of the proposed Chicken Industry Complex, was well attended by some 154 people. Invitations extended to the Councillors were taken up and we were pleased to see the Mayor Cr. Paul Stephenson, Cr. Denzil Sturgess, our own Cr. Inda Evans, and the Environmental Officer, Tina Dobson together with Robert Mowle the General Manager of Council present. We also received apologies from Alby Schultz MP some residents'.

Julian Vanslambrouck, a neutral resident from Goulburn, successfully chaired the meeting. Mr. Mikosic addressed the meeting briefly. Little information was given as to the size and production of the facility. However, based on facts previously shared by Mr. Mikosic, the complex would be comprised of 30 sheds capable of producing 8.9 million birds per annum and would need a 200 Megalitre requirement of water. We presented issues that highlighted some of the concerns with which we as residents would be faced.

The question and answer forum was never short of someone wanting a question answered from Mr. Mikosic or stating a personal viewpoint. It was certainly confirmed that there are many and varied issues that will affect all Bungonian residents and the shire, when one thinks of road maintenance and rates!

The Mayor, Cr. Paul Stephenson made himself known to the committee and offered to come back and discuss the proposal when it was finally submitted for Shire approval, including answering any questions that we may have at that time.

In the interim the Committee will be making every effort to get professional, expert and independent advice on the issues that were raised as well as those matters that were not raised at this time.

This is a designated development and despite being accused of "jumping the gun" we will only have a window of 28 days in which to place our objections and have expert testimony by report from all areas.

June 2003 UPDATE

CHICKENS CHICKENS CHICKENS CHICKENS CHICKENS CHICKENS —

MILLIONS OF THEM ??????????????????

Fortunately I was able to represent Landcare at the Public Meeting on the proposed CHICKEN DEVELOPMENT and certainly heard some very valid arguments from concerned residents and concerned they should be.. If this development is given the go ahead and proceeds it will change the district for ever--no more quiet country living, with clean air, water and open spaces. Why Sydney development has to be tolerated here amazes me. The opponents to this development should now concentrate on scientific facts not rhetoric to place all the objections to the Shire as soon as the EIS is lodged, the Shire by the way will not accept objections until they receive the application -- one would think they could afford another file to keep until they are valid (even an empty V.B carton would suffice). Congratulations to all those who attended and had their say, but I am surprised at the apathy of some residents who just do not care -- maybe they should think again -- do not whinge later.

The main issues which were raised included:-

1. Noise pollution both from the plant and traffic.
2. Dust and feather pollution.
3. Inadequacies of local road to handle traffic.
4. Quality of quiet country life style, which after all is why we are living here.
5. Quality of roof water which residents rely on.
6. Ground water pollution from over use of contaminated litter. Environmental impact on local restored wetlands and biodiversity.
7. Over use of ground water.
8. The application to increase ground water extraction from 2-200 ML /year is not sustainable and will affect water uses, including those who pump from Bungonia Creek.

I could speak with some knowledge on all these issues and will no doubt in future articles, but now will make residents aware on some of the grounds for opposition in the EIS soon to be lodged with Council(they will then have to accept your complaints and no doubt will have a special CHICKEN FILE.

The EIS must assess against the relevant provisions of :-

- SEPP 33 -- Hazardous and offensive development.
- SEPP 58 -- Protecting Sydney Water Supply.
- Draft--Sustaining the Catchments
- Mulwaree LEP 1995.

Ask the Council for a copy of all of them

The EIS must assess impacts on :-

1. Surface water quality-- known aquifers --flow data --water quality --bore yield-- potential contamination.
2. Water supply.
3. Waste management.
4. Air quality-- odours--dust contamination.
5. Soil impacts.
6. Noise, both during construction and operation.
7. Transport impacts.
8. Flora and fauna.
9. Pest control .
10. Land use conflicts.
11. Visual impact.

The EIS must also indicate how the environmental proposal would be monitored.

The EIS guidelines for " Poultry Farmers can be obtained from the Department Planning Centre --20 Lee St, SYDNEY or by Phone (02)9762 8044.

The proposal will also have to satisfy various requirements of Dept. of Agric, S.C.A., Public Health, EPA and RTA. Maybe some of the residents have influence in these departments.

Finally if you think your quiet country life style is worth protecting , then make your voice heard. (I believe there are Council Elections early next year).

Another very important factor not answered in any way by Steve Mikossic is the question of future land values. Who wants to live next to a MILLION CHICKENS ???.

Even more importantly would be the impact of over use of ground water. During the recent drought most paddocks on basalt country had to be serviced by reticulated water . Many adjoining properties have relied on this valuable resource for stock and domestic usage dating from the early days of shallow rock in wells

Inverary was serviced by a 5 meter well until it collapsed in 1990 and has since been replaced by a shallow bore, which accessed water as shallow as 4 meters.

The effect of no good water supply would render the most productive basalt country useless. The effect on property values could run into millions--- who compensates for this? -- Mr. Mikossic or the council if they accept the proposal ?????

All local landholders have to live with the DLWC farm dam policy and present water entitlements, so why should CHICKENS be exempt?

Creeks, Rivers & Rules AND YOUR INPUT

I wrote quite a while ago about the Water Management Act 2000 and how there would be rules brought in about water use and water sharing for the Shoalhaven River and its tributaries.

The Minister has established a water management committee for the Shoalhaven and Illawarra regions and I have been attending meetings regularly for the past couple of years.

The committee has so far developed a water sharing plan for the Kangaroo River above Hampden Bridge at Kangaroo Valley.

It is now starting work on the Shoalhaven River. As part of the process, several community "reference" groups will be formed. Their role will be to provide input and comment to the committee on the issues identified for water use and water sharing.

In our area, the relevant water courses are Nadgigomar Creek, Nerrimunga Creek, Jacqua Creek, Bungonia Creek, Jerrara Creek, Barbers Creek and their tributaries and the Shoalhaven River reaches of these tributaries.

The "reference" group needs to be representative and should include, if possible, licensed water users, landholders with riparian rights, and local environment, tourism and aboriginal reps.

Expressions of interest should state the representative position and provide a brief history of involvement in water use and in the local community. Some Interesting Water Facts

- The catchment supplies an annual average of 600 gigalitres of water to Warragamba Dam while Sydney actually uses 627 gigalitres
- There are 90,000 new homesites being released in Sydney shortly. This is in addition to developments such as demolition of houses to make way for multi storey units and townhouses, adding to the population.
- During the recent drought there were no water restrictions in Sydney
- Sydney Catchment Authority (SCA) has guaranteed 97% reliability in water supply. That means no restrictions 97% of the time.
- The SCA currently pumps about 3% of the storage in Tallowa Dam on the Shoalhaven into Warragamba to supplement Sydney's water needs
- Current plans and options include raising the Tallowa Dam wall by 5 metres to increase storage capacity and pump more water out for Sydney (but only in times of high river flows)

I haven't calculated how many gigalitres of rain fell in Sydney and Wollongong during last month's torrential downpours in those areas. All of it went straight down the drains and out to sea. What a waste!

Budget 2003/2004

Council's draft budget and management plan for 2003/2004 is now on display at Council and at Marulan Post Office.

You are welcome to have a read and make comments.

There are a couple of new items added to the budget this year. They include \$2000 grants to each of the community halls in the Shire, including Bungonia, Marulan and Tallong. A reliable annual income of this size should go some towards helping with inevitable costs.

GARDENING IN JUNE

Well, this is a very quiet month in the garden so take the opportunity to clean up rubbish such as dead grass as it can be good protection for insect pests. If there is a surplus of clean leaves commence making a compost heap. Compost is the cheapest source of organic matter in the garden, also use lawn clippings, animal manure, shrub and tree prunings. Don't use newspaper, fresh sawdust or wood shavings, eucalyptus leaves or pine needles as they can damage the soil.

Start the heap by spreading the material to a dept of 20 cm, then give a heavy dressing of agricultural lime and complete fertiliser, then cover with a layer of topsoil, let the heap build up to a depth of about 1m. Regularly turn the heap, this hastens the decomposition and make sure the compost heap is kept moist, not wet. During the warm weather compost should be ready for use in about 10 to 12 weeks.

Its also a good time to start planting your fruit trees too. We can grow a good variety of fruit trees here but we do have to be prepared to spray them during spring and summer. Remember that some need cross pollination, so ask your nursery when you buy them. Also remember that citrus trees are very difficult to grow in our climate.

Vegetables: the only seeds you can plant are broad beans, peas and onion seedlings, you can plant rhubarb crowns which like plenty of rotted manure, compost, balanced fertiliser and during warmer weather, plenty of water. You can also divide your strawberry plants now.

Flowers: Seedlings which can be planted now will start flowering in the spring. Stock, pansy, viola, primula, wallflower, russell lupins, delphiniums, foxgloves, iceland poppies, sweet william and calendula.

If you have a garden bed that is not being used, turn the soil over regularly to open it up. The frosts will sweeten the soil for spring planting.

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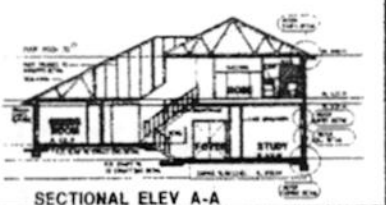
