GARDENING IN MAY

This is the time of year when a lot of general cleaning up can be carried out in your garden.

With cooler nights, mildew which is a fungus, can be seen on the leaves of Dahlias, Hydrangea, Petunias, Delphiniums, Easter Daisies, Pumpkins and Cucumbers as well as some others but it is not worth spraying with a fungicide. Delphiniums and Easter Daisies can be cut back about 8cm, above ground and with Dahlias, cut the stems above the leaf node. If you cut between the nodes, the stems being hollow can fill with water and the bulbs can rot.

Any leaves covered with mildew should not be put in compost heaps as this fungus will spread through your garden when the compost is spread next season. Make sure you burn those leaves or put them in the bin as garbage.

This month many perennial plants such as Polyanthus, Russell Lupin and Delphiniums can be divided making sure when you replant them to dig some compost into the garden as well as a light dressing of complete fertiliser.

Vegetables to sow are very limited as any seedlings planted now lay dormant during the winter months. Broad Beans are excellent to plant now, they do very well in the cooler climate, but before sowing the seed only, give the bed a good dressing of garden lime.

Onion plants are available now as well in nurseries. Plant white and odourless onions only though. Onions need very little water, plenty of sun, good drainage and before sowing a light dressing of complete fertiliser.

Flower seedlings that can be planted now include Calendula, Stock, Wallflower, Alyssum, Poppy, Pansy, Viola and Verbena.

Another general clean up job is to lift Gladioli bulbs and store them in a box or hang them up in an airy shed.

FARM WALK.

RESOURCE CENTRE.

Constructed by voluntary labour and funded by the Shoalhaven C.M.C. enables the group to store all their equipment and display material in one location. Available for field days and any visiting groups, it offers a teaching facility, catering centre and displays of what the Group has achieved since 1992. Thanks to the initiatives of the group and funding many on ground projects have been completed, all aimed at the restoring the environment, enabling sustainable farm management for the future. Take a copy of these notes with you on the 60 minute return walk to help explain what we have achieved.

FOLLOW THE RED ARROWS.

WETLANDS.

The walk follows Inverary Creek -- a permanently wet, boggy area fed by spring water seeping from under the basalt cap covering a large area to the South. All the creek lines have been fenced out to exclude stock and planted with various tree species. The wet areas have now been completely colonised by the reed cumbungi, which is an excellent silt trap to control sediments on site, You will cross the creek at the Solar pump and have a closer look.

IMPORTANCE OF GENETICS IN P. RADIATA PLANTINGS.

- The emphasis where commercial tree plantings have been established is on P.radiata. There are many reasons for favouring the exotic species over natives. We would like from the outset to dispel the many myths and misconcepts about P.radiata which we believe is the best landcare tool for our harsh conditions of acid soil types and rainfall. This does not mean natives have been neglected -- over 100 Eucalypt species and many Acacia, Casuarina and other species have been trialled and used in woodlots and shelter areas. Radiata Pines have the following advantages:-
- Cheaper and easier to establish and offer a high financial return.
- Grow successfully on acid soils and even help reverse the acidity.
- They are not biological deserts, but improve the biodiversity and harbour a rich variety of bird and animal life.
- They are the best commercial species for this area..
- They have few predators and diseases.

- Reduce dryland salinity and will grow on saline scald areas.
- Use very little herbicide or pesticide over a 30 year rotation.
- Improve soil structure and organic matter.
- Over 70% of pine biomass remains after harvest unlike other crops or pasture which are removed when grazed or harvested.
- They are 5 times as efficient as mature native forests in trapping carbon, so reduce greenhouse.
- They are not a fire hazard -- not as great as Eucalypts or unmanaged pastures.

Now we should have convinced even the ardent "nativists" that radiata is not a bad species after all. The importance of genetics is well illustrated at the first stop. The GF7 on the left has poor form compared to the plantation on the right. Unlike most other species pine has had a lot of research and improvement over the past few years. It is always best to plant the highest genetic suitable to the area.

TIMBER AND STOCK SHELTERS.

Trees have been planted as a dual purpose to provide shelter and eventually harvest for clear wood logs. By having different age plantings and eventually second rotation after harvest, there will always be stock shelter. The plantings have been designed for maximum shelter for lambing paddocks.

PRUNING AND THINNING.

The final value of the forest depends on how it is managed. In this area there is no pulp wood market, hence all the return is from a final crop of clearwood logs. The first thinning from 1000 per hectare to 600 with a first lift of 2.2 metres is carried out at year 6-7. A second lift to 4.2 metres and a final lift to allow for a 6.2 metre log and thinning to 300 per hectare ensures all high quality logs.

SOLAR PUMP.

In an attempt to create an artificial wetland in the dry "Gully from Hell" a solar pump will transfer water up to 40 litres per minute. Once installed the solar pump costs nothing to run and is maintenance free.

THE GULLY FROM HELL.

This massive dry gully has been carved into the old Eocene landscape by erosion over the last few hundred years. In a quite unusual erosion process the damage is done by soil moisture in the sub soil rather than running water. The soils formed on these old sediments are highly sodic and very dispersable. Once the sub soils become wet it will dissolve away in suspension. Tunnelling is very evident.

The solution as we see it, lies in controlling the ground water. The whole catchment of 40 hectares has been planted with commercial forestry, which when harvested over a space of several years will be replanted for a second rotation. This solution will, we hope, stop the erosion process and eventually stabilise this scar on the landscape. In the meantime the land is being used in a sustainable way to provide income estimated at \$500 per hectare per year on otherwise useless land. We see forestry in these soils as a win win situation for both the landowner and the environment.

ACACIA TRIALS. (to be established in 2000)

A part from *P.radiata*, there is a possible niche market for other species. This trial of 10 of the better Acacias is aimed at measuring their performance for possible timber and firewood production. Previous trials favour *Ac. Mearnsii* and *Ac. Decurrens* both local species.

EROSION CONTROL AND TREE PLANTING.

This site was a very active gully reclaimed by fencing out and tree planting. Surface water has been diverted by a low contour bank. Gullies like this can be treated without extensive earthwork.

DIRECT SEEDING.

This is a cheap tree establishing method. A whole cocktail of mixed natives is seeded directly into sprayed out pasture.

This branch of Inverary Creek was once very active, much like the 'Gully from Hell'. Since fencing out, stock exclusion and seeding, the gully has now stabilised. The banks have battered themselves and good grass cover is growing on the gully floor. Willows and poplars, as well as *radiata* has been used to soak up spring water. This method of gully reclamation is relatively cheap and needs no earthworks.

WINDBREAKS.

These have been planted in a N-S pattern over the whole property for shade and shelter. This species *E. Acaciaformis* is one of the better ones for this area, giving shelter to ground level and being reasonably insect resistant. It will also grow on the heavy black basalt soils.

WETLANDS.

Along the creek below the flume is what we want to achieve on all wet creek lines. Despite the adverse criticism of willows, the species planted here are beneficial in stabilising the creek, using up surface water and providing a useful drought fodder reserve. These willows do not produce viable seed and as long as undesirable hybrids are not planted they pose no environmental risk.

We hope you have enjoyed this Landcare experience and leave with some new ideas you can use in your own situation. This is a sample of what Inverary Group has achieved with limited resources. Support the Landcare ideals toward sustainable land use for the coming millennium.

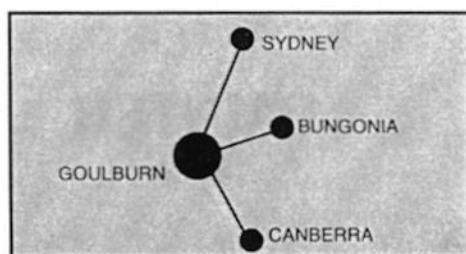

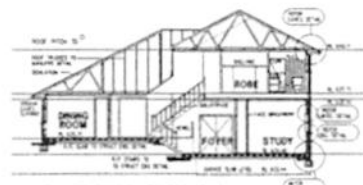
