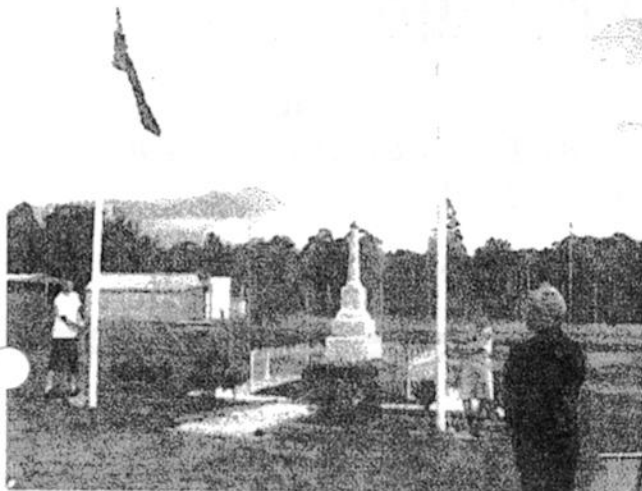

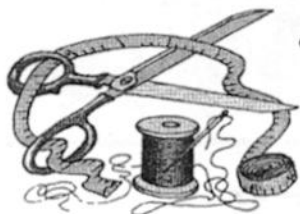

ANZAC DAY 25th. April 10am. Our usual Ceremony was held at the War Memorial on ANZAC Day. In these troubled times it's even more important to remember those who suffer as a result of war. A detailed report is included in this issue.

Bottle Bank: Allan Travers is no longer able to service the bottle bank. **A very special thanks to Allan for the years of service in keeping the area clean and tidy.** He never allowed the pile of bottle to accumulate and during holiday periods would clear the bank every day.

Chicken Farm: At the April meeting Steve and Jason Mikosic outlined their plans for a Broiler Rearing Farm at Ardmore Park near the Lumley Road turn off. It will be a very large complex developed over 5 to 6 years and eventually housing approximately 1,650,000 birds at various stages of development. They propose to put down 5 bores for water, build 5 houses on the property for the employees and to upgrade the electricity supply to enable three phase power to be used in the sheds.

In response to questions it was said that there would be 14 double bogie trucks a day (28 truck movements) through the village to service the complex. Some have suggested that this is a **very conservative estimate.**

MAY 2003 UPDATE

With the State election now behind us it's back to work as normal. Despite the predictable addition to national parks and other promises to attract green preferences there may be some positives from the election.

The, Premier Bob Carr, has signaled his 3rd term will focus on bridging the gap between farmers and conservation in an attempt to rescue "this battered old land" from the ravages of salinity and drought. He made it clear that environmental management and repair underpinned by economic competitiveness and unproved delivery of services -- would dominate the next four years.

"The test is more successful policies in rescuing this battered old land of Australia, afflicted with salt, our rivers in danger of degradation, the huge problems of land management that confront farmers and environmentalists alike, and challenge both of them to come up with new ways of making policy," he said

I am attempting to bridge the gap between farmers and environmentalist. We've got to push hard to find better ways of managing the land, by bringing farmers and conservationists to the table together."

There is really nothing very new in this, but may signal the Government has realised the past policies on natural resource management have not worked. After all a big percentage of the natural environment is on private land where farmers are battling to remain economically viable, so unless farmers are recognised as land stewards or land managers, there is little chance of solving the environmental problems.

Unfortunately in NSW the emphasis has always been on native vegetation. National resource management should also consider other factors, such as soils, soil erosion, water run off and water quality and economic factors. The argument our Landcare Group is having with the S.C.A. and NHT funding over the planting of exotic species such as *p.radiata* is a prime example. If any planned project can address the problems of water quality, salinity control, soil stability and soil erosion control, in addition to promising an economic return, then surely the question of what you plant should be irrelevant.

In the above example I am referring to the potential of farm faforestry in our area of poor acid soils where revegetation with natives is impractical. Hopefully this problem may be addressed in the next four years.

UPDATE ON GULLY FROM HELL.

The radiata plantings, now 6 and 7 years old have now been pruned and thinned to 600 per hectare. The effect on the gully and erosion has been very positive--the gully heads have now stabilised, the ground has a complete cover of native grasses, microleana and kangaroo grass and eurrated tussock advance has been stopped.

P.PINASTER AND P.BRUTIA TRIALS

The pinaster pine is growing quite well on the very dry and exposed ridges where it may be more suitable than radiata. This year with help of CSIRO we will be trialling an area of *p.brutia* another species more suited to dry sites CSIRO are also experimenting with other species more suitable for dry sites and we hope to trial some of these in future years

A Growth Strategy for the Shire

The phenomenal growth that Mulwaree Shire has experienced over the past ten years, becoming the fastest growing Shire outside the Sydney metro area, has given rise to a significant development in the thinking of the Shire.

Essentially, the major thrust of the current growth is in and around Marulan because the village is virtually on the highway and is an integral part of the Sydney-Canberra Corridor which has been on the State and Federal Government drawing boards since the early 1990s. I expect growth in Bungonia as well.

When growth of this magnitude is forshadowed, it is imperative that the parameters are set correctly and that all essential elements are included in the planning process.

What has now happened is that Council has commissioned a report – called the Settlement Strategy – which is currently in its draft stage – to help determine how we can best organise the future growth (and settlement) in the Shire.

It includes statistical information and projections of growth as well as providing information about aspects of development that must now be taken into consideration such as water catchment issues and “neutral or beneficial” effects of development.

The draft strategy has been submitted, as required, to the NSW Department of Planning and will eventually become a public document on exhibition for community comment.

I encourage everyone to look closely at the strategy and make comment on it as it is likely to become the blueprint for planning for Mulwaree Shire for the future.

Telecommunications

Optus will be erecting a telecommunications tower near the highway at Towrang.

No doubt this will improve mobile phone reception along the highway for their customers but an added bonus may be better reception west of the highway in some parts.

Keep an ear to the phones to see if there is any improvement after the tower has been installed.

Timeline? I guess only Optus knows at this stage.

Roads

The paddocks are looking greener after some autumn rains but the drought has not broken yet and water restrictions remain in place.

For roadworks, this means there are still limitations on the availability of water for road grading purposes.

There is a backlog of grading work on the books and the troops are doing their best to get as much done as they can under the circumstances.

Hall Renovations

Congratulations to Bungonia Progress Association on their success in obtaining a State Government grant for some renovations to Bungonia Hall.

It is well deserved and will make a big difference.

Council has previously offered to give some assistance in kind and I shall keep them to that promise.

GARDENING IN MAY

This is the time of year when a lot of general cleaning up can be carried out in your garden.

With cooler nights, mildew which is a fungus, can be seen on the leaves of Dahlias, Hydrangea, Petunias, Delphiniums, Easter Daisies, Pumpkins and Cucumbers as well as some others but it is not worth spraying with a fungicide. Delphiniums and Easter Daisies can be cut back about 8cm, above ground and with Dahlias, cut the stems above the leaf node. If you cut between the nodes, the stems being hollow can fill with water and the bulbs can rot.

Any leaves covered with mildew should not be put in compost heaps as this fungus will spread through your garden when the compost is spread next season. Make sure you burn those leaves or put them in the bin as garbage.

This month many perennial plants such as Polyanthus, Russell Lupin and Delphiniums can be divided making sure when you replant them to dig some compost into the garden as well as a light dressing of complete fertiliser.

Vegetables to sow are very limited as any seedlings planted now lay dormant during the winter months. Broad Beans are excellent to plant now, they do very well in the cooler climate, but before sowing the seed only, give the bed a good dressing of garden lime.

Onion plants are available now as well in nurseries. Plant white and odourless onions only though. Onions need very little water, plenty of sun, good drainage and before sowing a light dressing of complete fertiliser.

Flower seedlings that can be planted now include Calendula, Stock, Wallflower, Alyssum, Poppy, Pansy, Viola and Verbena.

Another general clean up job is to lift Gladioli bulbs and store them in a box or hang them up in a airy shed.

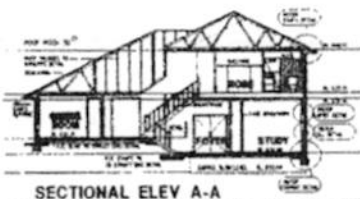

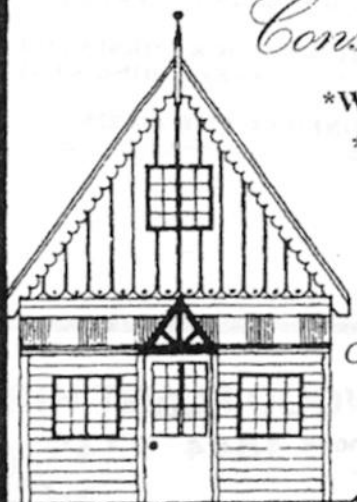
