LANDCARE CATCHMENT MANAGEMENT FORUM AT PARKS. PUTTING NATIVE CONSERVATION IN PERSPECTIVE ERIC ROLLS

We should not spend time trying to reverse history. The whole concept of wilderness is utter biological nonsense, since not one hectare of land remained undisturbed by Aboriginals long before white settlement, Aboriginals used the land and modified it to their needs.

Australia has the largest stock of game animals in the World, with our kangaroo population precious. The strange attitude to not eating naïve animals must change – we do after all eat BAMBI and RUDOLF. The ban on Australian Kangaroo is tragic. Kangaroos are a huge resource waiting to be exploited by controlled farming and harvesting. What could be more sustainable for the environment than reducing the impact of overstocking of hoofed animals and farming kangaroos. This would help the spread of native pastures and turn what is now regarded as a pest into a useful resource. This could all happen within the present grazing enterprises with no additional capital input.

The multicultural society of our main cities, such as Sydney is an environmental disaster with many children growing up with no knowledge of our plants, animals and soils. Environmental education must target urban audiences, so the growing population can make a balanced decision in the future on environmental issues. Landcare bodies, both urban and rural must lobby and make powerful statements.

Sustainable farming may mean changes of practice and attitude, but farmers cannot be expected to accept a loss of income. If they are to be expected to withdraw some areas from production, reduce stocking, use less fertilisers and aim towards sustainability, they will have to be adequately compensated. The concept of managing remnants is great for the environment, but managers have to be compensated for loss of production and weed and feral animal control.

An area of at least 30,000 square kilometers is regarded as a safe area for sustaining native animal population, so it is important to link remnants. The stock routes and rural land reserves are a precious resource as in some areas they are the only remnants left. The reserves system in Australia is simply not working and never will unless we support conservation on private land and connect these and reserves with native corridors.

Speakers from ACF realise we have now reached the limit of volunteerism and that the private sector and Government must take up the running. Rural urban links must be restored with rural Australia, reformed by revegetation and farm forestry. Markets will in the future demand sustainable production.

Australian Democrat speaker suggested the NHT had failed, because of rigid regulations, biased against private land. The States have cost shifted using the NHT to fund Government Department programmes. For Landcare to survive, he said, must change, recognise the problems and offer incentive in tax structure and joint projects.

The main message over 2 days is that the present system of conservation has failed. It needs private landholders support, with more incentives. The objections to utilising native resources must be ignored. We have a huge resource, so lets get together and use them sustainably into the future.

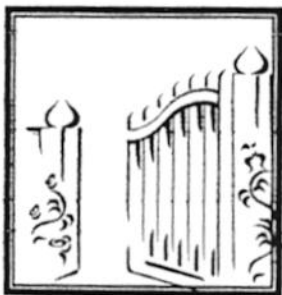

Gardening in November

It is time to fertilise the lawn. Use a good lawn fertiliser and if we don't have a lot of rain, then we need to put plenty of water on them so the fertiliser does not burn the lawn.

Roses should be sprayed with Malathon or Rogor if aphids appear and you can also spray with Zineb or Benlate for Black Spot. If you go to your nursery, they may stock a general rose spray which will treat most things with one chemical. Also, feed your roses with a complete fertiliser.

Plant salad vegetables such as lettuce, squash and cucumber now for a Christmas harvest.

It is also time to watch for fruit fly as well, they are active on developing fruit and tomatoes. Telltale signs are small pockmarks on the fruit. Tomatoes have a small pinprick and the surrounding area stays green. Apply a splash bait made from 7ml of maldison and 50g of sugar, dissolved in 1 litre of water. Splash mixture onto leaves and trunks. Fenthion (Lebayid) and dimethoate (Rogar) will control fruit flies but must be used strictly as directed.

Feed Citrus and other fruit trees with blood and bone or all purpose plant food. Apply as far as the dripline or the extent of branch spread. Soak the area well.

Handy Hints: Clean moss and algae from paths which were in the shade during winter to make your garden safer. The simplest way is to apply neat vinegar or a mix of equal parts water and strong disinfectant. Scrub firmly with a stiff brush, leave for an hour or so and hose off residue with a strong jet from the hose. If the problem persists, repeat the process in one week. This method does not affect the plants and environment the way chemicals do.

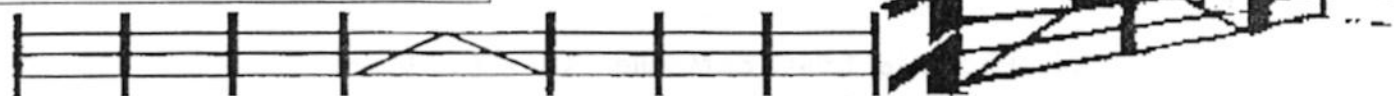

TAKE THE TIME . . ALWAYS CHECK

The sun is shining, you have the time and your horse looks very inviting, yes this is the day to find the gear and ride into spring. This is going to be fun; you might ride over to the neighbor's, or maybe try a few new things you saw on that show last night. Definitely the way to go, fun in the great outdoors, with the company of your trusted steed.

WOA, just before you start lets take a look at safety, yours and your mounts.

1. Thoroughly examine all saddlery and riding equipment, including your attire. The best way to be aware of your equipment's state is to clean and /or dress it. Always pay special attention to stitching and fittings; damaged gear can often be mended. Leather needs to be dressed, if very dry try baby oil(please note that baby oil should not be used all the time, as it makes the leather too soft). PVC and other man made products can normally be washed, or wiped over, stiff metal fittings may respond to oil being worked into them.
2. Saddlecloths should be clean; if your saddlecloth is stiff with dirt and dried sweat it could cause discomfort or skin irritation to your mount. When your mount is uncomfortable, his or her response to the rider will not be ride friendly.
3. Always check your horse's gear, including rugs for spiders, wasps and other biting insects.
4. Your equipment must fit , properly on your horse, ill fitting gear is dangerous.
5. Your riding helmet, make sure there is no badly worn areas particularly in the chinstraps, and no weakness in the external structure. The lining should not have pieces missing or overly worn thin areas. Try it on, do up the chinstrap and lean over, a good fitting hat will stay in place! If your riding helmet wont stay in place, and you are wearing it correctly, obtain one that does. A worn or badly fitting riding helmet ,WILL NOT SAVE YOU.
6. Riding boots, should be a comfortable fit and like riding helmets kept in good condition. Look after riding boots properly and they will last for years, clean and polish them after each use if your boots become excessively wet dry them and then dress as you would other leather items. Riding boots are as important as Riding helmets, incorrect footwear could have you hooked up and or dragged.

Take the time to check your riding equipment, keep safe, and have lots of fun in the sunny spring weather with your four footed friend.

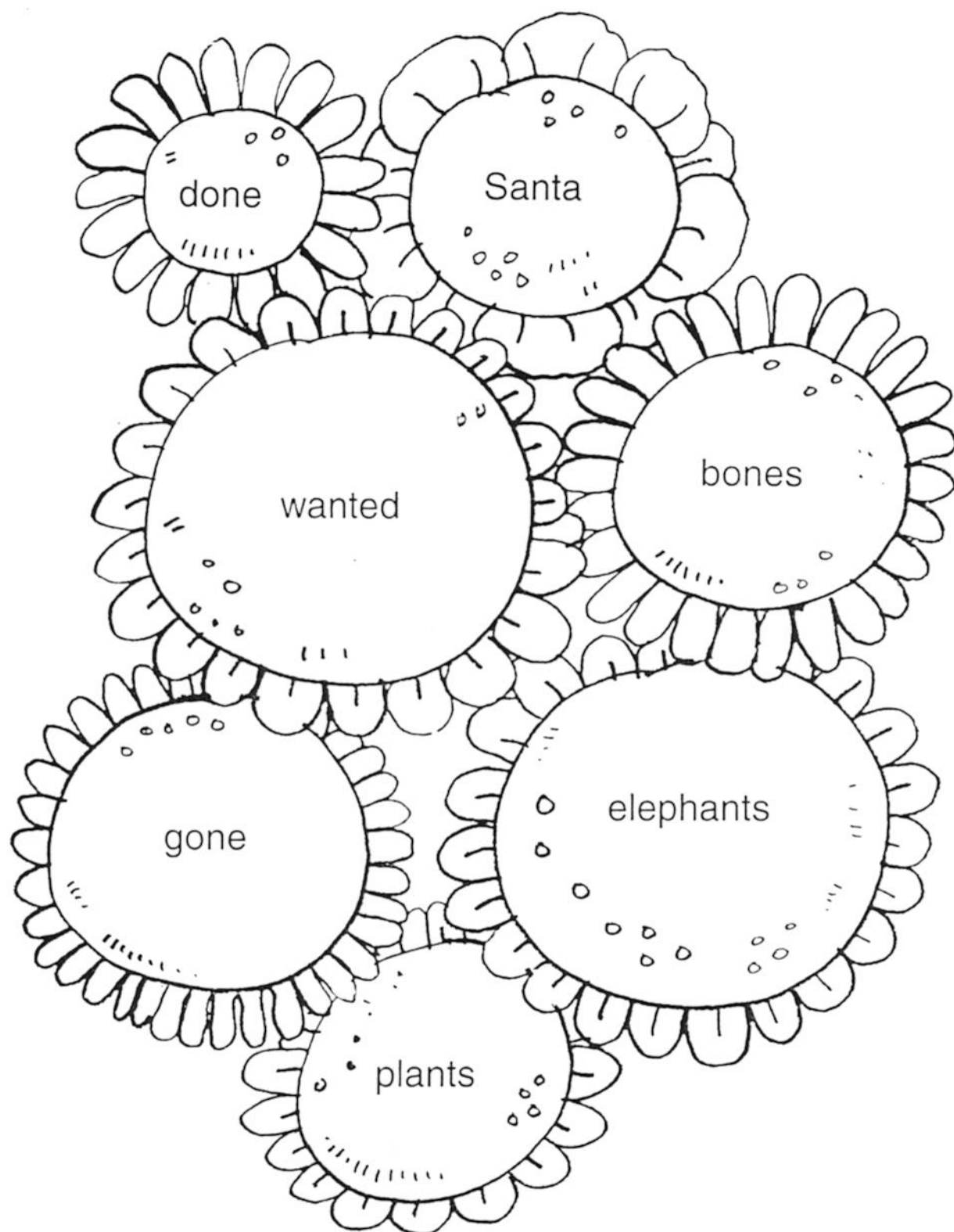
