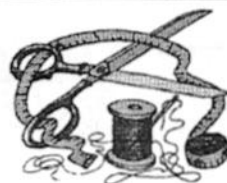

Working for a Safer Community

The next Meeting of the Bungonia & District Rural Watch is to be held in Bungonia Hall on Monday evening 17 November, 2003 commencing at 6.30 p.m.

Business meetings are held every three months. The next meeting will feature a guest speaker, followed by supper. All members of the public are welcome to attend and to join rural watch.

The group was formed last year after an abnormally high incidence of crime in the area. Locals wanted to know how they could help the police and return to a feeling of "safety" in the area. Sadly, one can't go back to the leaving the key in the car ignition and the back door open. However, we can all be more vigilant and report any unusual movements of traffic in our area. If you are going away, have a neighbour collect your mail, check the house and yards regularly and notify the local police. They're the "good guys" who will step up patrols in your home area if you are going away.

Rural Watch is not only concerned for the people who live here but also those who travel our roads. They are lobbying the local council and the RTA about "black spots" in this area. These are:

1. Jerrara Road T-Junction where it meets Mountain Ash Road.
2. Lumley Road T-Junction where it meets Oallen Ford Road.
3. Blind Spot on King Street, the main through-road, outside Bungonia Hall
4. 60 kilometre zone through Bungonia Village

Presidents report Bungonia Progress Association

AGM 9.08.03 1.30 pm Bungonia Progress hall.

The past year has been one of steady progress but not without some hold-ups! insurance being the biggest hurdle. Moira McGinity persevered and eventually we were able to obtain insurance especially Public Liability at a cost that would not bankrupt the Association.

The Progress Association members has been a helper and participant in the village celebrations which have occurred over the last 12 months. By the different organisations and trusts joining together, all have benefited financially and have made the village celebrations bigger and better.

A sizeable grant has been received from the State Government special needs area. This grant will be used to build a disabled accessible entrance to the Bungonia Village Hall. Disability Toilets and showers are incorporated into the new entrance design. A special thanks to Barry Storm for drawing up the plans which are currently waiting to come back from Council so that the building firms can be asked to quote and contracts can be let for the work. The access will then become the main entrance to the Hall.

NOVEMBER 2003 UPDATE

CLIMATE CHANGE OVER SOUTHERN AUSTRALIA -- LOCAL SIGNIFANCE

The recent articles on water availability for chicken developments, especially when relying on underground water, have become even more relevant following the release of research on climate changes by Monish University and C.S.I.R.O.

Australia, one of the worlds top agricultural supply nations, is currently in the worst drought for 100 years. The drought may be over in Sydney and Newcastle, but is still very evident locally so water issues are more critical. According to latest research. Australia may be facing a permanent drought because of an accelerating vortex of winds whipping around Antarctica that threatens to disrupt rainfall. Spinning faster and tighter the 100 mile an hour jetstream is pulling climate bands south and dragging rain from Australia into the Southern Ocean. Water resource managers are already treating rainfall decline as permanent and realise changed management and consumption will be necessary. Any E.I.S. for future development should consider an overall water management plan to encompass this latest research as it makes our underground water reserves a very valuable and vulnerable resource which must be protected --surly no one can justify a development which requests 200 ML per year at the expense of all the neighboring properties.

LANDCARE ANNUAL MEETING.

Election of officers and setting the agenda for next year will be held at "INVERARY" 590 Inverary Road, Bungonia on Monday 24th November at 7.30.p.m.

FUNDING FROM S.C.A.

A small grant of \$6000 has been promised from the Sydney Catchment Authority to continue with catchment work on Spring creek. The earthwork and ground preparation have already been completed and extensive planting of native trees will follow the first worth while rain.

VISIT FROM WESTERN SYDNEY UNIVERSITY.

A large group of students visited the "Gully from Hell" and were very impressed by the progress made with farm forestry plantings and reclamation. The radiata plantings are now 7 years old and have been pruned and thinned and hopefully if we experience a wet season will control the ground water and erosion processes. The radiata plantings have also controlled the spread of serrated tussock. Visits, such as this will help bridge the gap in thinking about natural resource management between country and urban residents.

SERRATED TUSSOCK.

This continues to be number one weed of the area so any control methods should be considered. The council now seems to admit it is beyond control in some inaccessible areas, so it may be time to look at pine plantings as screens, to prevent spread from these other local areas. Well planned commercial plantations are both an economic option and a practical one to prevent tussock spread.

Grants to our communities

Last month Cr Maureen Eddy and I had the great pleasure of presenting cheques of \$2000 to each of the Shire's schools and community halls. Bungonia Hall is included and will, I am sure, make the best use of these funds.

The school grants are for their libraries and the grants for the halls will go towards improvements as required in each area.

These funds provide some extra community facilities and we hope that they will become an annual contribution.

Development

Poultry Guidelines

The Bungonia residents group had the opportunity to address Council at the September meeting about issues that are important to them.

I certainly appreciated hearing first hand what they had to say and I think everyone was able to add a bit of knowledge to the subject.

Serrated Tussock

My wording last month about serrated tussock has apparently caused some misunderstanding so I take this opportunity to clarify the issues.

I wrote about parts of the Shire being known to have "intractable" infestations of tussock.

This is the description used by Geoff Young of Bush and Land Care Services in a report received by Council.

This does not mean that Council has or

indeed can renege on its responsibilities to ensure that all noxious weeds are controlled and eventually eradicated.

I'm sure everyone will agree that serrated tussock is one of worst weeds we have and is often very difficult to manage but we must still soldier on.

It would be nice if State or Federal Government found some extra funds to inject into weed control, especially biological controls, and help the battling landholders.

Blue Bins

There are still problems being experienced with the rural waste bins in several areas.

After the October long weekend in particular, it seems many people found time to do some spring cleaning and the bins overflowed in no time.

I ask everyone to be considerate when using the bins. They have been provided for local residents for disposal of ordinary household rubbish only.

Please don't use the bins as an easy means of getting rid of junk that should really be taken to Marulan tip.

Rural/Urban Addressing

In some parts of the Shire, there has been a problem with house and property numbering where a rural road passes through a village and some village properties could therefore have the same number as a rural property further out.

Council proposes to rename the affected urban roads by calling them streets in the urban areas rather than roads. In Marulan, for example, Brayton Road in the urban section would become Brayton Street.

The problem does not affect Bungonia as it has King Street between Oallen Ford and Mountain Ash Roads.

GARDENING IN NOVEMBER

It is time to fertilise the lawn. Use a good lawn fertiliser and if we don't have a lot of rain, then we need to put plenty of water on them so the fertiliser does not burn the lawn.

Roses should be sprayed with Malathon or Rogor if aphids appear and you can also spray with Zineb or Benlate for Black Spot. If you go to your nursery, they may stock a general rose spray which will treat most things with one chemical. Also, feed your roses with a complete fertiliser.

Plant salad vegetables such as lettuce, squash and cucumber now for a Christmas harvest.

It is also time to watch for fruit fly as well, they are active on developing fruit and tomatoes. Telltale signs are small pockmarks on the fruit. Tomatoes have a small pinprick and the surrounding area stays green. Apply a splash bait made from 7ml of maldison and 50g of sugar, dissolved in 1 litre of water. Splash mixture onto leaves and trunks. Fenthion (Lebayid) and dimethoate (Rogar) will control fruit flies but must be used strictly as directed.

Feed Citrus and other fruit trees with blood and bone or all purpose plant food. Apply as far as the pline or the extent of branch spread. Soak the area well.

Handy Hints: Clean moss and algae from paths which were in the shade during winter to make your garden safer. The simplest way is to apply neat vinegar or a mix of equal parts water and strong disinfectant. Scrub firmly with a stiff brush, leave for an hour or so and hose off residue with a strong jet from the hose. If the problem persists, repeat the process in one week. This method does not affect the plants and environment the way chemicals do.
