GARDENING IN OCTOBER

Well, if you haven't sprung into action yet, now's the time because Spring has Sprung.

For your vegetable garden it is time to plant Cucumber, Zucchini, Melons, Pumpkin, Squash, Capsicums, Corn, Beans and Tomatoes.

In the flower department you can plant Alyssum, Californian Poppy, Cosmos, Everlasting Daisy, Lavatera, Marigold, Nasturtium, Petunia, Torenia, Sunflower and Zinnia.

Also, if you need to feed your lawns, now is the time. It should be done in early spring is the ideal time to rejuvenate the lawn but when we are all busy, we often forget. Start by running a spiked roller over it, the small holes allow air, water and fertiliser to penetrate. You can rent spiked rollers from any equipment hire company or you can simply use a garden fork to make the holes (but think about the size of the area first).

Next, water the grass with a wetting agent (from a nursery) to remove the waxy coating that builds up on soil particles. This makes the ground more absorbent and water can soak right in (at the moment, I know we are waterlogged!). Finish by feeding the grass with lawn food, watered in well after application.

Natives need Nurturing

It's a myth that Australian native plants need little or no attention. If you don't prune them, they can soon look straggly and unattractive, if you don't water and feed them, the weakened plants become easy targets for pests and diseases.

Many natives, including wattles and bottlebrushes will look and flower better and live longer if they are pruned right after blooming. Trim all over to just beyond where the flowers were. Do this every year from the time you plant them. While you're at it, cut out any dead sticks and you'll do wonders for the look of the plant.

After pruning, feed native with fertilisers specially formulated for them or use blood and bone. Apply strictly as directed, one application is usually sufficient. Water in deeply and thoroughly and thereafter water natives regularly. How often you should water depends on your climate and soil, but a deep soaking once a week is a good starting point.

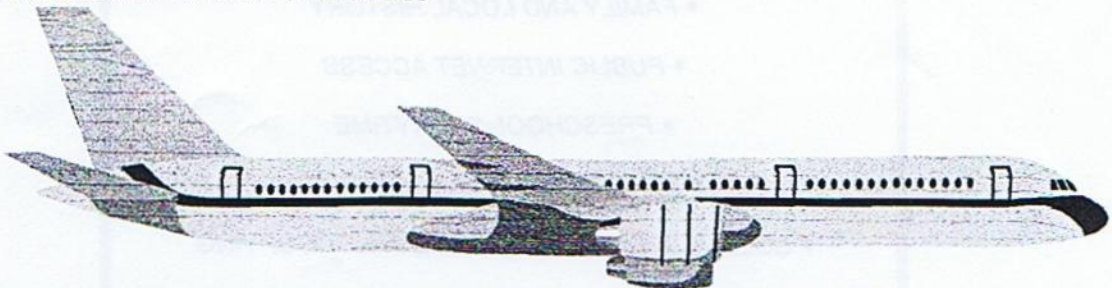

Many of our borrowers love fiction books, but do you really know how to find out what is available at your library?

One way to find out is to search for your favourite author on the library catalogue. Another way you can find new diction is by looking through the New Titles List, located adjacent to the Loans Desk. If the title that you want to borrow is on loan or located at another branch library, you may place a free reservation on it directly from the catalogue, or ask the library staff to place it for you.

Some patience is required, and you may have to wait a while for the item, because new fiction titles are very popular with our borrowers. However placing a free reservation ensures that your name will be placed in the queue, for the item you wish to borrow, and the library will automatically notify you when it is ready for you to collect.

Keep an eye on the library's shelves too, as new fiction titles will appear regularly because a quantity of fiction books are rotated around our branches at regular intervals. 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In Council with Inda Evans

Subdivision Approval

A 9-lot subdivision which spans an area from the Lookdown Road to Inverary Road has been approved.

Ecotourism

A development application has been approved for an Ecotourism establishment on the corner of Jerrara Road and Marulan South Road. It was first approved several years ago but that approval lapsed because no further action was taken on the development. I understand this was because of several problems regarding the heritage nature of the site (Old Marulan village).

The present application, in two separate parts, proposes to construct 41 underground motel units, a conference centre, restaurant, with associated infrastructure, and reconstruction of the original Golden Fleece Hotel as an art gallery.

The development is to be for the Aboriginal Ecotourism and Training Co Pty Ltd.

Bed & Breakfast

New guidelines for Bed & Breakfast establishments have been developed. These replace an earlier development control plan and essentially make it easier for anyone wanting to establish such a business, particularly if older historic buildings are involved.

Locality Signs

There are 115 locality signs to be placed in the Shire. You will recall that the localities, and their boundaries, were determined before the road naming process began.

Signs showing the names of these localities will be progressively installed over the next few years at the boundaries at the boundaries of each locality. They should not be confused with village signs which are a separate exercise.

Land Sharing

There is a piece of State Legislation known as State Environmental

Planning Policy No 15 (SEPP 15) - Rural Land Sharing Communities which allows for multiple dwellings on properties owned in common by several people. This is different from community title subdivisions. However, most of Mulwaree Shire, including all of our region, has been exempted from SEPP 15 because it is in the outer catchment area of Sydney Water.

Sewage Management

The State Government has extended the deadline for registration of existing septic systems, however Council urges you to lodge your registration form as soon as possible if you have not already done so.

We made a decision to undertake this task at no cost to ratepayers and will be adopting the most flexible system possible for subsequent annual "inspection" at minimal, if any, cost to you.

With the recent problems of contamination in Sydney's drinking water, someone somewhere is sure to start searching down river for a cause of the problem and we would like to be in a position to say Mulwaree Shire residents are all doing the right thing.

Social/Community Plan

The Local Government Act requires Council to have a Social Plan for providing services and facilities to the community, taking into account cultural diversity and the needs of children.

Our limited funds mean that priorities will need to be established for any new programs identified.

There will be information in Council's next newsletter asking you to write in about what you see as the community's needs. A more detailed questionnaire will be sent out to interested individuals and community groups. Please take the time to participate as it will help immensely in establishing this plan.

Roads

In addition to the usual re-sealing, patching, gravel re-sheeting and general maintenance work on all the Shire's

roads, the works scheduled for the Bungonia area are listed below.

Lumley Road

In 1993 Bungonia Progress Association wrote to Council about a "black spot" approximately 3.5kms from the start of Lumley Road. There has been some confusion about Council's response, so here is the schedule:

Bitumen sealing from the Oallen Ford Road end commenced in 1994/95 and so far about 3.8kms has been completed, including road formation, widening and minor drainage improvements. This section includes the "black spot" area complained about which was promised to be completed during 1996.

A further 3.7kms of bitumen sealing is on Council's current five year program and will take the sealed section to Bungonia Heights.

Apart from weather, there have been some problems along the way. Land needs to be acquired for the next section of work but the non-resident owner has not responded to any of Council's letters. At the last meeting, Council resolved on compulsory acquisition of the required 1.6ha of land. Following completion of this process, work will be able to re-commence.

Tanglewood Close

Damage left to the road after recent Telstra work has been reported and appropriate action will be taken on this issue.

Oallen Ford Road

Substantial work has already been completed on this road and major re-construction will continue during 1998/99.

NEW PROJECTS AND FUNDING.

INVERARY CREEK LANDCARE GROUP.

The winter period had seen the completion of the acid soils forestry project and work on Inverary Creek as well as forestry trials at Carne. Two new grants have been successful for 1999. An acid soil native pasture trial on liming rates at Yellow Dam (\$7369) and creek restoration along the head of Washedaway Creek (\$6480). National Heritage Trust funding should be announced soon, hopefully recommending further projects.

FUTURE OF LANDCARE.

The Decade of Landcare ends in 2000 and beyond that into the new millennium the funding sources will have to rely on N.H.T. and corporate sponsorship. The future directions were debated at length at a 2 day seminar in Orange in September, where Inverary Creek Landcare were invited to stage a display. To complicate matters locally the amalgamation of the Upper and Lower Shoalhaven Catchment is still not finalised, but I will be representing this area on the new C.M.C. All funding in future will be on a regional basis to meet broad directions of the Catchment Management Committees.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT POLICIES ON FARM FORESTRY.

Mulwaree Shire is at present considering it's position on Farm Forestry looking towards the Governments 2020 Vision. At present there is no uniform State legislation covering forestry development. Our Landcare Groups position is quite clear. We believe in an "as of rights policy" where small plantations up to 10 hectare annually are regarded as just another farming enterprise and no further regulations are needed. As well as any Shire regulations, any future development must also come under Harvest Guarantee and Native Vegetation. The Shire policy will no doubt be publicised when it is formulated.

FORESTRY AND WOOL A GOOD DOUBLE.

An interesting article in September Farm Journal. "One outstanding difference between livestock producers involved in forestry and those who aren't is their long term vision". The latest consultant report shows 10,000 D.S.E. is the minimum for a family business to survive without off farm income" Even at this level the status quo is unlikely to be sustainable as it fails to address land degradation issues such as increasing soil acidity, compaction and loss of soil organic matter.

In contrast the improved pasture and forestry approach provides a basis for the farm to become a viable family operation with income from sheep and eventually forestry".

The above quote is from an article on a Holbrook property, but applies in our area. An added bonus is of course, the potential of income from carbon trading to offset greenhouse emissions.

FIELD DAY.

The next field day will look at the Washedaway Creek restoration.

SUNDAY 25th OCTOBER. Meet at Inverary Landcare Field Day Area by 10.00am for an inspection of the works. A B,B,Q, to follow. Also keep in mind the Annual Meeting will be held at "INVERARY PARK" Monday 9th November. at 7.30 pm, where funding projects for 1999-2000 will be discussed.

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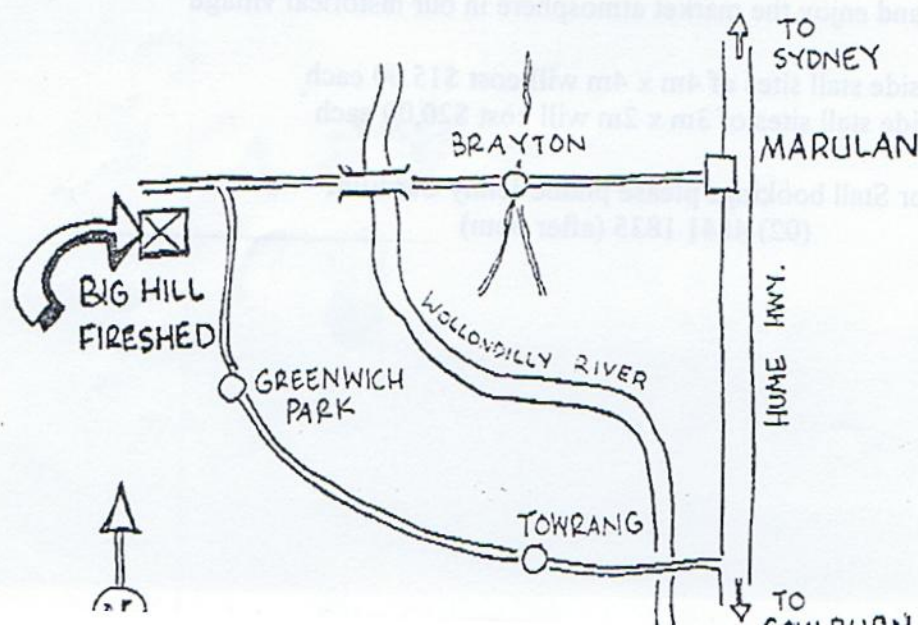
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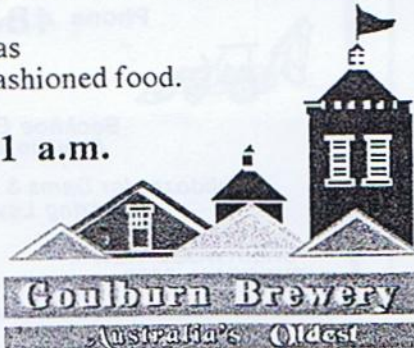
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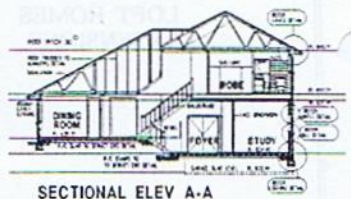
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
