The President's Report for the year ending the 30th of June 1999.

This meeting marks the end of the first year of office of the board of trustees which was appointed in 1998.

The consequence of all but one of the previous trustees not nominating for reappointment has been, obviously, a board which has a different attitude to, and different thoughts about the nature of the park, its purpose, and its management.

To this end, a set of aims and objectives has been approved, and a management plan suggested. The latter may be approved at a future meeting.

In general, the outlook of the trustees has been to open the park the free and easy access by the public, to establish active facilities for the benefit of children and of adults, building on the facilities provided by the previous trustees. In opening up the park, we are following, as well as our own inclinations, the policy of the Department of Land and Water Conservation whose delegated authority we exercise.

To specify our recent activities: fences have been removed (and more will be), tree stumps have been burnt and others remain to be dealt with, applications have been made to the Department of Sport and Recreation for funding to re-establish and equip the children's playground; to the Natural Heritage Fund for funding to begin to deal with the control of exotic weeds, the removal of rubbish, and for conservation of native biology along the Bungonia and Woodward's Creeks; to the Windellama Bushfire Brigade which is offering funds for local projects; and to the Federal "Their Service-Our Heritage" program to add the names of World War I veterans to the war memorial. Special thanks are due to Russell Koenig and Bill Feeney for their taking the initiative to paint the fence around the war memorial. That inspired us to conduct our first Anzac memorial service, the first for many years and the first for the years to come. Applications for funding are also about to be made to the Mulwaree Shire Council's funds from Woodlawn royalties, and to the Readers' Digest.

PARK TRUST Continued

The park trustees strongly support the Progress Association's venture of a village beautification project and intend to act in liaison with that work to the extent that it is consonant with the park trustees' aims and objectives.

It would appear from casual comments made by a number of people that our work so far has met with approval; approval both of our objectives and their effects. That is very encouraging indeed and is testament to the work done by the trustees, to their enthusiasm, their known intentions of co-operation with other groups and organisations, and their policy of free communication with their community. The park is, after all, theirs, not just ours; and while the trustees must preserve independence, they can only work effectively within their community.

Lastly, I thank my fellow trustees for their high level of thought and their principled outlook towards our fellow-citizens' rights to the park, and to the serious damage which has been done over a long period of time to the ecology of our small area of responsibility.

GARDENING IN OCTOBER

October is a very busy time garden wise! The worst of the frosts are over and spring flowering trees and shrubs are showing mass displays of blooms. One small tree which is most attractive is the Golden Chain Tree (*Laburnum Vosii*) and it takes 4 or 5 years to reach a height of 3m.

In October some of the climbers come into flower too. The *Clematis montana rubens* makes a magnificent display, requiring only very light mesh to climb over, just make sure the roots are well mulched during the summer as they grow close to the surface.

Vegetable Seeds to sow are: carrots, parsnips, beetroot, peas, cabbage, silver beet, radish, cucumber, zucchini, melons, pumpkins, squash, parsley, capsicums sweet corn, beans, celery and tomatoes.

Tomatoes grow best in a sunny position containing plenty of compost. When planting out new seedlings, apply a dressing of complete fertiliser, high in phosphorous during the main growing season. Fertilise every 2 weeks with a water soluble fertiliser on cool, overcast days or late in the evening. Fertilising during the day can result in the plants being burnt.

Most varieties require staking and in our climate, the strongest prevailing winds come from the west to the north. Drive the stake into the ground first, then plant the tomato on the eastern side of the stake, the reason for this is to that the plant is blown against the stake. If planted on the opposite side the plant can break off at the ties.

Remember, to increase the quantity and quality of the tomatoes, pruning can be beneficial. Remove the laterals which grow from the leaf base.

Flowers: there are also lots of flowers that can be planted now, some can be used as borders to make any garden look stunning or they can be used in groups to act as pots of colour throughout the garden.

By using different leaf textures and leaf colours you can produce a magnificent display in your own garden. Browse your local nursery and colour your garden.

Bulbs: when spring flowering bulbs such as hyacinths, daffodils, jonquils, ranunculus and anemone finish flowering, this is the month to feed them with a complete fertiliser, this assists the bulbs for next years flowers.

Remember, leave the bulbs leaves to die down naturally. This also feeds the plant for next year. Bulbs can also be dug up and kept in cloth sacks in a cool dark place until next winter or they can be left in the ground to flower next year.

Important Notice

Septic tanks and on-site sewage management systems are still in the headlines.

The Government requires that all systems be inspected annually and certified OK to operate. Only a few areas have been classified as sensitive and most systems could be self-inspected by their owners, if the owners are accredited.

Put simply, you have two choices:

- 1 Have Council inspect your on-site system annually. There will have to be an annual charge on this.
- 2 Become accredited and inspect your own system yourself. You will need to lodge your inspection report to Council annually. The cost here would be your one-off seminar cost to become accredited and then annually one postage stamp to send in your report.

I urge you to consider participating in a one-day seminar to become a self-certifier of your system if you operate a septic tank.

Council is considering running a one-day seminar that will then qualify you to self-certify your own system and so provide the annual report to Council that will be required.

The course would be run by the Institute for Sustainable Futures and could be arranged in Bungonia or Marulan if 40 or more people are interested in participating. The cost would be \$40 per person.

Anomalies in State Legislation

Council deferred making a decision on an application to subdivide at Tarago last meeting (August) because of an apparent anomaly with the new State Government legislation.

Effectively, the Department of Urban Affairs and Planning was refusing to support this application as it did not meet their guideline for on-site sewerage to be located at least 100 metres from a creek.

This, however, was in spite of scientific evidence which indicated that the proposal would be quite safe on this site because of the topography.

It seems the Department is strictly to its 100 metre rule, even if water had to run uphill to reach the creek, and is not looking at individual sites.

Questions are being asked on this one.

Developments

A subdivision into six lots has been approved on Oallen Ford Road, 6kms south of Bungonia. Deferred conditions include identifying sewerage sites on the lots to ensure they are located away from the creek.

A number of farm forestry developments have been approved along Inverary Road to grow pine trees.

OCTOBER 1999 UPDATE.

REPORT ON FARM FORESTRY EXPO 99 TARCUTTA 7.8.99

The main messages coming from the Expo were quite assuring, but made you realise there is a lot of work to be done before Farm Forestry becomes a sustainable industry in NSW. The guest speakers from Pennsylvania, USA made an interesting comparison to Australia. Farm Forestry there has gone through the over exploitation stage where huge areas of native forests were cleared with the no thought to the future, to a stage where the now regenerated forest is managed towards a sustainable yield. This scenario is not as simple in Australia where soils in general are less fertile and rainfall limited. We can not rely solely on regeneration, but need to plant large areas to replace forests that should never have been cleared.

However farmers should act now to include forestry in their farming programme even though it will not be harvested in their lifetime. The next generation can then harvest and replant, so production will be maintained for future generations.

Tim Vercoe from CSIRO gave a very interesting address on seed collection and the importance of provenance and species. It is imperative that more research work is done now to match the species and provenances to our very varied environments. Any grower contemplating a Farm Forestry venture must understand the land capabilities, what effects tree growth, what is available, what is the end use or purpose and consider risk management. Site factors of rainfall, temperature extremes, soils, soil acidity, depth and salinity must be considered. It is obvious much more research needs to be done on native species to improve the genetics and control breeding.

The visit to a two man operated cypress pine mill demonstrated what can be done on value adding to the timber products. Farmers in the future may consider milling their own plantations and secure their own markets, particularly if they are too far from a large established mill.

Allan Cummine from AFG, also pointed out what must be changed and simplified in Government regulations, which now can be a deterrent rather than encouraging Farm Forestry ventures. It is important we develop a forestry culture both at the farm level and Government level. The attitudes of State and Local Governments in many cases will have to change. There is an urgent need to continue existing funding through NHT, CMC and Landcare, but also to increase it dramatically for large on ground plantings.

Farm Forestry is recognised as a win win situation for the environment. Even though it is hard to quantify in dollar terms the benefit to the farmer in shade, shelter, improved pasture growth and erosion control is obvious, as well as the indirect benefits of better water quality, less pollution and controlling greenhouse emissions. CMC and Landcare groups must stress this in their policies and strategies and encourage more tree plantings.

Farm Forestry has spread from the higher rainfall areas to the drier slopes and tablelands. This is where extensive trial plantings are needed. The two bus trips to the Tumbarumba area (wetter sites) and Coolaman-June (drier areas) showed many of the trials. My main interest was in the drier areas similar to Upper Shoalhaven where rainfall and soil conditions may limit *P.radiata*. Two pine species from the Mediterranean, *P.pinasta* and *P.brutia* are being trialled and improved, as well as many slower growing native species. We hope to trial these species as well as several *Acacias* next year at Inverary.
