During the year, 10 meetings were held with an average of 7 people attending. We welcome all new members and thank all who supported the Association during the year.

The Association organised 2 Market Days, a Christmas Party, Anzac Day Morning Tea, a Community Garage Sale and a Septic Tank Training day with the Mulwaree Shire. A Bungonia Cook Book has also been developed and will be ready for sale by this Christmas.

The profits from these events are used to pay for Community Hall expenses including the general maintenance and upgrading of the Hall.

The fume hood and freezer, donated to the Hall, have been utilised by the Market Day cooks and work well.

The Mulwaree Shire Council again supported the Association financially by donating the equivalent of the Council rates and by attending to matters raised by the Association. Council has sealed a further stretch of Lumley Road. All roads have been given unique names and all residents have property numbers to help the emergency services and the postie find people and properties much more easily.

GARDENING IN OCTOBER

October is a very busy time garden wise! The worst of the frosts are over and spring flowering trees and shrubs are showing mass displays of blooms. One small tree which is most attractive is the Golden Chain Tree (Laburnum Vosii) and it takes 4 or 5 years to reach a height of 3m.

In October some of the climbers come into flower too. The Clematis montana rubens makes a magnificent display, requiring only very light mesh to climb over, just make sure the roots are well mulched during the summer as they grow close to the surface.

Vegetable Seeds to sow are: carrots, parsnips, beetroot, peas, cabbage, silver beet, radish, cucumber, zucchini, melons, pumpkins, squash, parsley, capsicums sweet corn, beans, celery and tomatoes.

Tomatoes grow best in a sunny position containing plenty of compost. When planting out new seedlings, apply a dressing of complete fertiliser, high in phosphorous during the main growing season. Fertilise every 2 weeks with a water soluble fertiliser on cool, overcast days or late in the evening. Fertilising during the day can result in the plants being burnt.

Most varieties require staking and in our climate, the strongest prevailing winds come from the west to the north. Drive the stake into the ground first, then plant the tomato on the eastern side of the stake, the reason for this is to that the plant is blown against the stake. If planted on the opposite side the plant can break off at the ties.

Remember, to increase the quantity and quality of the tomatoes, pruning can be beneficial. Remove the laterals which grow from the leaf base.

Flowers: there are also lots of flowers that can be planted now, some can be used as borders to make any garden look stunning or they can be used in groups to act as pots of colour throughout the garden.

By using different leaf textures and leaf colours you can produce a magnificent display in your own garden. Browse your local nursery and colour your garden.

Bulbs: when spring flowering bulbs such as hyacinths, daffodils, jonquils, ranunculus and anomone finish flowering, this is the month to feed them with a complete Fertilise, this assists the bulbs for next years flowers.

Remember, leave the bulbs leaves to die down naturally. This also feeds the plant for next year. Bulbs can also be dug up and kept in cloth sacks in a cool dark place until next winter or they can be left in the ground to flower next year.

The Goulburn Library's free public access to the Internet has become so popular with users that we have introduced a booking system to ensure that all our users can access the service. Bookings can be made in person or by phone - 4823 4435, and are available in half hour blocks with a limit of 1 per person per day.

The advantages of free access to the Internet enables us to provide users with varied information resources beyond our physical collection, however there are some guidelines to usage that you should be aware of:

- The Library does not monitor and has no control over the information available online and cannot be held responsible for its content.
- Restricting or monitoring access to the Internet by children aged under 18 is the responsibility of the parent or legal guardian. This is in accordance with library policy in regard to access to any library resources.
- Children under the age of 8 years are not to use the computers without a responsible adult present.

To ensure that the service meets expectations we need the cooperation of parents to ensure their children are able to safely take advantage of the wealth of information available online:

- Read and accept the Library's Conditions of Internet Access
- Participate in your child's Internet session
- Become familiar with the Internet resources your child is using
- Encourage your child to evaluate the validity of information found on the Internet
- Discuss with them the topics that you consider off-limits
- Remind your child that not everyone on the Internet is who they say they are
- Advise your child not to give out any identifying information over the Internet. This includes their name, home address, telephone number and email address.
- Public complaints regarding Internet content should be directed to the Australian Broadcasting Authority site - www.aba.gov.au.

OCTOBER REPORT.**FARM FORESTRY TRAINING COURSES.**

These courses in chain saw operation, tree felling, planting and maintenance of plantations have been completed. A reminder to all that these are Nationally Accredited Courses with all successful participants receiving certificates and that they are open to all members of the public. They are being sponsored free of charge through our Landcare and N.S.W. Timber Industry Training. The courses in pruning in October will no doubt be popular, so reserve your place now with Doug Werrin.

REPORT ON LANDCARE FORUM. "BREAKING NEW GROUND"

This was organised by the Wollondilly Catchment. Several speakers spoke on the past and future of Landcare now the Decade of Landcare has finished. Many expressed concern on future funding and it now appears funding from government sources will be quite limited, so individual groups should be seeking corporate sponsorships. This is an option our Group will be considering. In the meantime we have been notified of an \$8,000 grant from Sydney Catchment Authority for Farm Forestry development on eroded, acid soil area in the Spring Creek Catchment, which will enable the establishment of further 6-7 hectares. This grant is very pleasing, showing the commitment of the Sydney catchment Authority to catchment improvement and protection.

WATER REFORMS.

This was mentioned by various speakers and no doubt some new controls and regulations will be forthcoming. One fact emphasised by S.C.A. concerning riparian areas is that they will encourage the fencing out of waterways to exclude stock, but in no way will anyone be forced to do so. You may have read a previous letter in the Land regarding the so called "drocorian" reforms --- this is sensational rubbish. The S.C.A. want to work with landholders not enforce regulations.

DINNER ADDRESS BY IAN KEIRNAN. "CLEAN UP AUSTRALIA"

The address was quite interesting, but one fact is quite clear - he has no farming background and no idea on how to achieve sustainable farming objectives. The clean up project on Sydney Harbour, Lord Howe Island, Taronga Zoo and others are very impressive, but I feel these have little reference to Landcare and what is needed to achieve both environmental and economic sustainability. Several speakers from the floor brought out some points that farmers find it difficult to work towards sustainable environmental goals, unless there are viable economic returns. One fact is quite clear that all Australians not only landholders, must help fund environmental restoration and sustainability, either by paying higher prices for primary products or maybe by an environmental levy similar to medicare. To combat the problem of erosion, poor water quality, salinity and acid soils there needs to be a massive fund injection. The token 52 million dollars allocated over 5 years by the N.S.W. Government for salinity is hopelessly inadequate - it is well past time for Governments both State and federal to become serious over environmental problems and provide the necessary funds for some real restoration.



Mobile Horse Services

September Hints.

With the promise of warmer weather, vaccinations come to mind. Routine vaccination against tetanus and strangles are worthwhile preventative treatments. The cost of vaccination is minor and far cheaper than veterinary treatments. Tetanus, if not detected very early often leads to death. Although equines may still contract strangles after having the vaccination, the disease is in its mildest form.

There are many good reasons to take care of all saddlery and other equine equipment. While cleaning gear always pay particular attention to stitching and areas of constant wear. Damaged equipment may lead to unnecessary injury, of equine and/or handler.

Safety is not restricted to the horse's equipment, the cloths one wears while riding are just as important. Protective riding apparel, needs to be kept in good condition. Damaged hats offer less protection, while illfitting ones offer little protection. Loose hats come off, offering no protection to falling riders. The importance of riding boots can never be over stated. The wrong footwear can lead to such dangerous situations, no one wants to be caught up and/or dragged along.

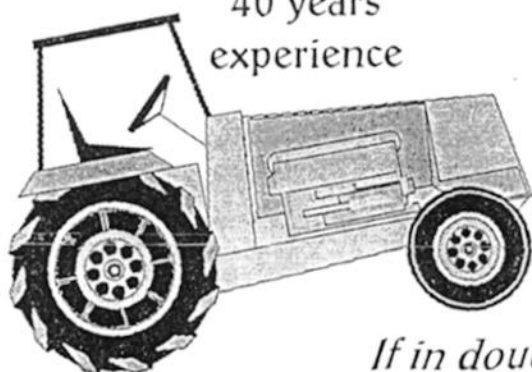
