## CONTROLLING SERRATED TUSSOCK?

Landowners must continually suppress and control Serrated Tussock but are we using the correct tools to do so? Is the weed itself outwitting us? Are the powers that be forcing us to destroy the productivity of our land?

In a letter to the Minister for Agriculture in April 2003 I said I believed the control of Serrated Tussock is beyond the capability and financial resources of the ordinary landholder. As a W2 noxious weed, where the seeds are dispersed by wind, I told him it is an unfair, unjust, stress-laden burden to compel a landholder to fully and continuously suppress and destroy the weed.

I pointed out to him that the W2 program in relation to this wind dispersed seed has been in place in Mulwaree Shire since 1928 (75 years – a lifetime!) and has proved to be totally inadequate; indeed, it has patently failed. Once an area is colonised it continues to be colonised while seed moves on, colonising new areas. The area affected grows and grows by the day. Another policy must be sought.

His response, in June 2003, was that NSW Agriculture, the Cooperative Research Centre for Australian Weeds, a research scientist, working in cooperation with CSIRO, and the Victorian Department of Primary Industries were, together and/or separately, seeking serrated tussock management options.

There had also been a state-wide review in 1999 which he felt demonstrated a satisfactory program. My response was that I could show him thousands of hectares cleared, i.e. poisoned, some time between then and now (mid 2003) which are again fully infested. I re-iterated that we landholders cannot tolerate the burden; nor, did I believe, can the land cope with continuous chemical applications.

There was no further response.

Before that, in Spring 2001, I complained in writing to the then Mulwaree Shire weeds inspector my dissatisfaction with the chemical, Taskforce®. His response demonstrated that he was aware there was a problem, my complaint was not the only one, but he did not know what was wrong.

It is now, five years later, that I learn that, according to the present Goulburn Mulwaree weeds inspector, Malcolm Ross, Taskforce® does not work in dry soil. Spraying should only 'be conducted after significant rainfall', he advises.

So, at last, I have an explanation for the chemical's failure; we have been without soil moisture for over five years! But the plot thickens. Taskforce® is inappropriate for use in most native pastures (which we are supposed to encourage) and there is a genuine risk, according to researchers, of frequent chemical applications forming a serrated tussock monoculture.

Look at all the Taskforce® we have squandered, doing our duty and causing what soil damage we cannot know. Not to mention the cost in money, time and labour. Indeed, we have been handed an expensive but pretty weak control weapon in the chemical department.

As an alternative, The Weed Management Guide suggests chipping isolated plants with a mattock but warns that chipping large patches where a seedbank has built up will only lead to germination of seeds in the disturbed soil.

Ploughing and growing strong pasture such as phalaris seems to be the control answer but, again, how can we do that in drought conditions?

More worrying still, the plant itself seems to have altered, adapted to a new life of better soils courtesy of our drought conditions. Originally slow to establish and mature, the huge seed head compensated for the plant's weakness. Now, though, in depleted, once vigorous pastures, the weed is racing ahead, maturing early. Some plants flower when only a few months old; others are flowering twice a year.

Biological control would seem the soundest method. A rust fungus and a smut fungus, both with high, hopefully safe, potential were identified in 2000; I can find no follow up news over the past five years. What has happened?

### **And what are we to do?**

The Minister must be made aware of the problem, feel the depth of our disappointment in his strategy and the hopelessness of the situation from our point of view. As one council weeds inspector told me some years ago: the people must involve the polities or nothing will change.

## GARDENING IN OCTOBER

October is a very busy time garden wise! The worst of the frosts are over and spring flowering trees and shrubs are showing mass displays of blooms. One small tree which is most attractive is the Golden Chain Tree (*Laburnum Vosii*) and it takes 4 or 5 years to reach a height of 3m.

In October some of the climbers come into flower too. The *Clematis montana rubens* makes a magnificent display, requiring only very light mesh to climb over, just make sure the roots are well mulched during the summer as they grow close to the surface.

Vegetable Seeds to sow are: carrots, parsnips, beetroot, peas, cabbage, silver beet, radish, cucumber, zucchini, melons, pumpkins, squash, parsley, capsicums sweet corn, beans, celery and tomatoes.

Tomatoes grow best in a sunny position containing plenty of compost. When planting out new seedlings, apply a dressing of complete fertiliser, high in phosphorous during the main growing season. Fertilise every 2 weeks with a water soluble fertiliser on cool, overcast days or late in the evening. Fertilising during the day can result in the plants being burnt.

Most varieties require staking and in our climate, the strongest prevailing winds come from the west to the north. Drive the stake into the ground first, then plant the tomato on the eastern side of the stake, the reason for this is to that the plant is blown against the stake. If planted on the opposite side the plant can break off at the ties.

Remember, to increase the quantity and quality of the tomatoes, pruning can be beneficial. Remove the laterals which grow from the leaf base.

Flowers: there are also lots of flowers that can be planted now, some can be used as borders to make any garden look stunning or they can be used in groups to act as pots of colour throughout the garden.

By using different leaf textures and leaf colours you can produce a magnificent display in your own garden. Browse your local nursery and colour your garden.

Bulbs: when spring flowering bulbs such as hyacinths, daffodils, jonquils, ranunculus and anomone finish flowering, this is the month to feed them with a complete fertiliser, this assists the bulbs for next years flowers.

Remember, leave the bulbs leaves to die down naturally. This also feeds the plant for next year. Bulbs can also be dug up and kept in cloth sacks in a cool dark place until next winter or they can be left in the ground to flower next year.

## Horse – ing Around – Horse care for Spring.

Spring is here and your horse will be losing its winter coat. If it's been rugged over winter the hair needs to be removed from the rug as well as the horse. I use a mane and tail brush on the rug and a currycomb or a 'magic block' on the horse. It will take a while to remove all the hair but if you intend to show your horse this season you need to work on its coat now.

Now is a good time to worm your horse. Buy a wormer that does all worms and change brands yearly as worms tend to build up a resistance to the same wormer. Mares in foal will sometimes abort from a wormer so read instructions or buy a wormer that excludes bots. If you have trouble or are not sure how to give it to the horse ask someone who handles horses to show you how and the next time have a go yourself. Some horses are difficult to do and may need a twitch on. Be aware that the odd horse will strike with their front legs so don't stand directly in front. A strike can cause severe injury like a kick so never put yourself in harms way. Horses are unpredictable and respond to fear and pain.

Teeth need checking at least once a year I have all mine done in September and any new arrivals at time of arrival. Bad teeth cost poor health and money. If your horse suffers from any of these; drops food from its mouth, has bad breath, is poor in condition or is 'hating' the bit, pulling, excess chomping, blood in the mouth it may more that likely need the 'tooth fairy'.

Insects are a burden of the warmer weather. Some horses are allergic to bites and stings. An allergic reaction needs vet attention as it can kill. Lice are active at the present. A pour such as "Switch" is the easiest way to rid them but powders and washes are also good. Remember to clean and powder the rugs and wash all brushes as well. Skin infections like ringworm, rain scold, mange and Queensland Itch are more prevalent in warmer weather so check skin when grooming your horse as early detection is easier to treat. The flies annoy their eyes and cause infections. Bath twice a day with salt water. Use clean cottonwool on each eye as infections spread. Pat dry with a clean cloth and apply an eye cream (Orbenin Eye Ointment, available from your vet.) Fly veils and netting help to keep the flies down but some horses spook with them so put on in a small area and lead the horse around first to see if your horse is o.k. with it. Never use veils if the horse is left unattended for more than a day. Like rugs they can move and rub and halters can get hooked on fences or such leaving the horse stranded or panic and injure it self.

Mares are starting to cycle and some are moody (yes guys, just like us women.) So your usually quiet mare may be out of sorts. If your mare is really bad there are herbs and vitamins that can help or medication from the vet. Or you can make her happy and put her in foal. Foaling is a great experience but can be costly and a lot of work so do some research first and make an informed decision.

Laminitis, commonly known as Founder is most likely to occur in spring. There are several causes but most common cause is the horse over eats the flush of nice sweet grass, this reacts in the system and causes acute lameness. In severe cases the horse's pedal bone in the hoof will rotate and descend through the sole of the hoof. Needless to say your horse will need to be destroyed. Founder is to be avoided by keeping a close watch on your horse. It mostly affects ponies. If body fat is high and the crest of the neck hard then put your pony on a diet! Put it in a yard and feed small dry feed with a little green or a yard by night with no feed and a short graze by day. There is a food additive called Founder Guard, which is very good, or you can attach a muzzle to your horse for some of the day this allows the pony movement around the paddock and to drink but limits grazing. Exercise your pony often. Yes the pony will 'tell' you its starving and it will make you feel mean but the old saying is you have to be cruel to be kind is true. Founder is very bad! Avoid at all costs!

**TREE PLANTING UPDATE** – All planting of P.Radiata would be now complete under reasonable conditions. They need rain now, but should at least have a good start. With native plantings in spring try and time the planting with rain, as even a small rain event of a few mm's will help. Best of luck but the forecast is not too promising.

**AUSTRALIAN FOREST GROWERS CONFERENCE** – will be held in Launceston from October 23<sup>rd</sup> till 25<sup>th</sup>, so I will report on this in November. I have been very fortunate in winning the "NSW Tree Farmer of The Year Award" for 2006., so will attend the annual Conference. This was a very pleasant surprise, as I had no idea I was even nominated. Inverary now has a lot to offer on trial plantings and has results from 1990 onwards and is open to anyone to come and visit. (Just ring 48 444 214).

The conference will give a great opportunity to talk to growers from other states and compare how they are fairing with all the governmental controls. Both Landcare and tree farming seem to have stalled in NSW, smothered in regulations and red tape. Surely the policy makers in NSW even under the thumb of the green lobby will eventually come to their senses and realise they have to work with landowners, not crippling them with regulations conforming to the various Acts. The Tree Farmer of the Year award is even sweeter to me as I have openly opposed the concept of natives only for NSW and push the idea of Natural Resource Management for both environmental and economic results. A commercial forest can achieve all the right environmental results such as erosion control, salinity, water and healthy catchments, probably even better than all native plantings.

**WEED CONTROL** – in tree plantings will be necessary in the spring and if the weather is hotter than normal, be very careful with any oversprays such as forest granules. I wouldn't recommend any spraying or fertilising above about 23 C. With fertilisers such as MAP or DAP, a lot of nitrogen volatilises so is lost to the air and with Forest Mix granules, try to apply to moist soil

**ARDMORE PARKS** – appeal to the Land and Environment Court will be held soon and hopefully start with an on site inspection. The appeal will be opposed on environmental, health, water supplies, as well as amenity and traffic problems. I trust the court is wise enough to finally put this shoddy proposal to rest. Landcare has presented its opposition to the council lawyers.

**WETLANDS PROJECT ON INVERARY PARK** – will go ahead with plantings of natives in spring. All material for water reticulation for alternate stock watering points have been purchased and will be installed when the ground is softer after rain. As a back up to seedlings, the area in question will be hand seeded with a local Eucalypt mix. Areas of wet creek line on Limekiln Creek have also been planted with cuttings of American Cottonwoods, an excellent species for wetter areas, for shade and erosion control and an alternative to Willows. These cuttings are always available free in the spring for anyone wishing to try them.

**ACACIA TRIALS** – I have not been very happy with the results since planting in 2000. The best growth and survival rates have been the local species of A.decurrens, A.mearnsii and A.parramatensis. Other species suitable for mixed wood lots are A.rubida, A.retinodes and A.pravissima. The older plantings 89-93 are now mostly dead – killed by wood grubs – good value for fisherman and firewood.

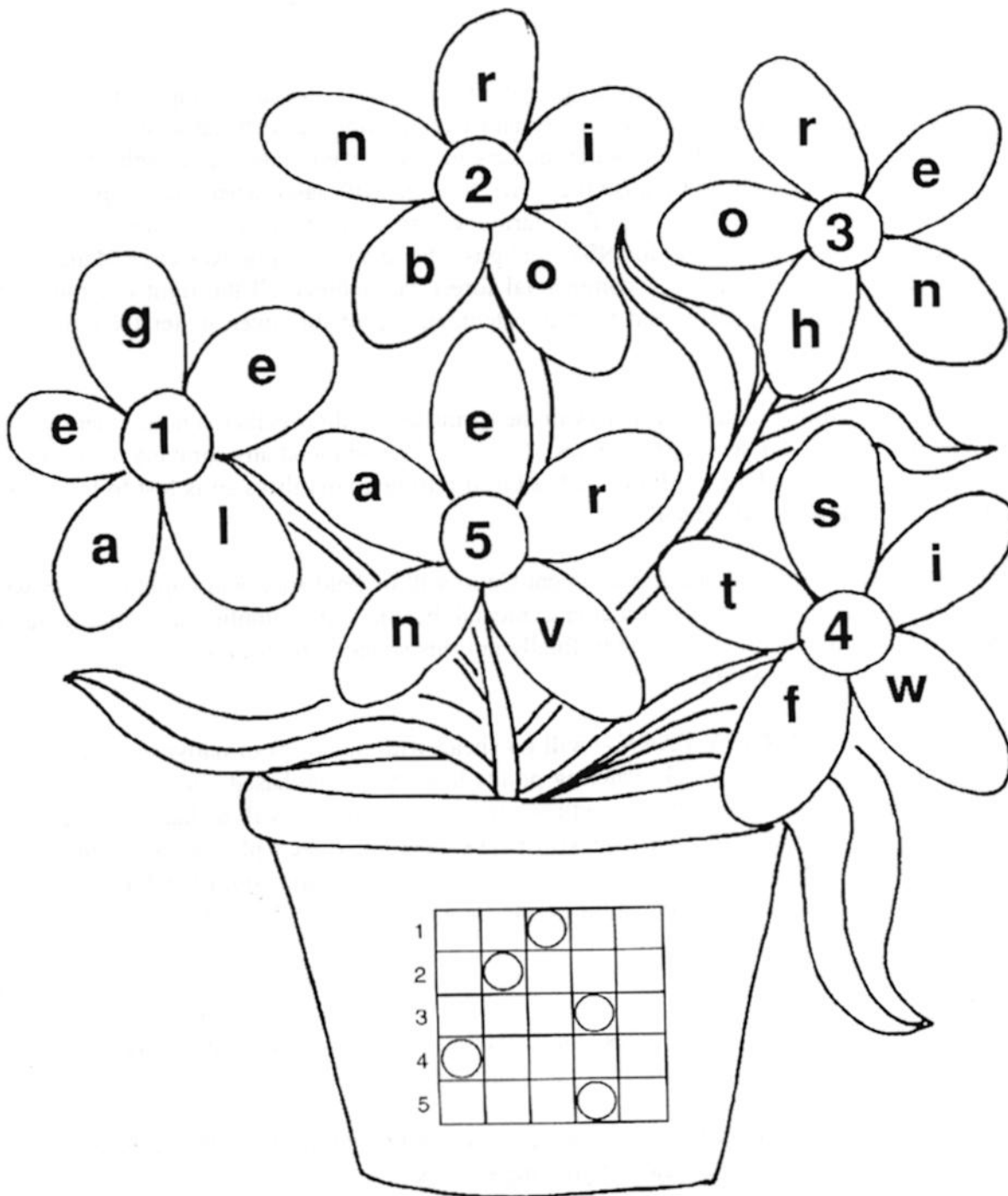
There is a lot of literature around about the benefits of Acacias, but I don't recommend extensive plantings here except for perhaps a quick proven crop to protect slower growing species.
